PUBLISHER'S NOTE

According to the City of Dubuque website our town clock was originally erected in 1873, on top of a building on Main Street and was moved to the Plaza in 1971. The clock, accurate to within two seconds each week, was operated with weights that were wound by cranks, which ran through a shaft into the basement of the building. The largest clock in America is located on the Duquesne Brewing Company building in Pittsburgh. It was the largest single-face clock in the world when it was installed in 1933. The world's largest cuckoo clock is in the center of Swiss Village in Sugarcreek, OH. Every half hour, a cuckoo bird pops out and you hear Swiss polka music playing as the band emerges and a couple dances. Nothing against cuckoo clocks, but I'm sort of happy this one isn't in Dubuque.



Dubuque's Farmers' Market, the oldest farmers' market in the state of Iowa, is the perfect place to source a fresh, farm-to-table meal whether you're looking for breakfast, lunch, or dinner options. With more than 100 vendors, there's something to please everyone.

ubuque's Farmers' Market started in 1840 in the city's Flat Iron Park, the oldest platted city park in Iowa. Later, the market moved to the Upper Main District of Dubuque, where area shoppers have been buying fresh produce, meat, eggs, and more since 1858. Originally, the market operated inside the newly completed City Hall Building. Farmers backed up their horse-drawn wagons and carts to specially constructed windowsills and unloaded their goods directly into the building. In 1879, the market moved to the streets surrounding City Hall. Today, more than 100 stands line Iowa Street and extend up and down 11th, 12th, and 13th Streets. Dubuque's summer Farmers' Market operates on Saturday mornings, May through September from 7 AM until 12 PM. In October, the market runs from 8 AM until 12 PM. As always, the market operates rain or shine.

In early July 2024, three generations of our family met the challenge of sourcing our Saturday night dinner with items purchased from Dubuque's Farmers' Market. We were on the hunt for appetizers, meat, vegetables, dessert, and wine. When we reached the bus-

tling streets of the market, family members went separate ways, each with an assignment to complete. The results of our shopping were impressive!

APPETIZER 1

We sent our teenage grandsons in search of appetizers. They ignored the assignment and headed straight to their favorite Kruse Farms stand behind City Hall where they purchased three loaves of banana bread. The boys have been enjoying Kruse's banana bread since they were very young, weaving their scooters through the crowds of shoppers to their destination. While the boys think of Kruse Farms as a bakery stand, they also are known for their home-grown produce. The Kruse family has been at the market for more than 50 years as four generations operate the stand and work in the four-acre garden located in the Lancaster, Wisconsin area. When the produce is abundant, they sell in bulk from the end of their stand. While the banana bread wasn't really a true appetizer, we made it work and enjoyed every bite.

APPETIZER 2

Our second appetizer didn't really qualify as

an appetizer either, but the pepper jack cheese from Bellmann Dairy Farms in Cuba City, Wisconsin, paired nicely with our meat and vegetables. Bellmann Farms also sells beef, chicken, eggs, jerky, pork, potatoes, sweet corn, and more.

VEGETABLES

Fincel's stand at the corner of Iowa and 12th offered one-stop shopping for their popular sweet corn along with a variety of peppers, tomatoes, onions, and even some peaches imported from the South. Known throughout the Tri-state area for their early July kick-off to the sweet corn season, the lines in front of their produce tables were long but moved quickly. Fincel's, headquartered across the river in East Dubuque, is proud of their longstanding popularity in the community. They even have a written mission statement "to provide the freshest, most delicious produce to our customers. We believe that sustainable farming practices are essential for the health of our planet and our customers. We do not use GMO seeds. We plant and harvest in many of the same ways as in earlier generations. Our produce is all handpicked." Fincel's produce is always fresh and always tasty.

MEAT

The center piece of our meal was a tender beef flank steak from Our Farm Meats out of Elkader, Iowa. Owners Jerry and Wanda Brink wrote, "Our Farm Meats come from antibiotic, hormone, and stress-free purebred

Hampshire hogs & Fleckvieh Simmental cattle; they've been taken care of by us from start to finish. As a family pork and beef producer, we are committed to producing a safe and wholesome product in a responsible way. We take pride in the animal care, health and environmental wellbeing." In addition to beef steaks, Our Farm Meats offers a variety of bacon, sausage, pork chops, ham steaks, ribs, roasts, several ready-to-eat meat sticks, jerky, and more." As promised, the meat was tender and favorable.

WINE

Our son-in-law Chris tasted and selected two bottles of wine from Dyersville's O So Good Winery/Distillery market stand – a Sauvignon Blanc and an El Diablo Rojos. O So Good Winery is a family-owned winery, restaurant, and distillery. They have been selling wine from their stand at Farmers' Market since 2017. "We offer 28 different wines each Saturday," said Lee Ostwinkle, president/founder of O So Good Winery/Distillery. "We rotate different wines through the 50

different kinds we produce." We enjoyed the white wine with our meal, and it was a perfect complement to the meat and veggies.

DESSERT

Daughter Jennifer, raised in Dubuque but currently living in Texas, was put in charge of dessert. She selected a strawberry rhubarb pie from the Sunset Bakery out of Platteville, Wisconsin. "I picked it because it's nostalgic for me," she said. "I love rhubarb pie, and we don't get it in Texas." The Sunset Bakery and Produce stand is operated by Southwest Wisconsin Amish families who bring "homegrown produce and mouth-watering baked goods" to the Farmers' Market. The pie was delicious and the perfect finish to our farm-to-table meal.

The preparation of our meal was simple. Chris seasoned the flank steak with East Dubuque's Grandpa Porky's All-Purpose Seasoning – an item that we also purchased at the market. We grilled the steak and steamed the vegetables in foil on the grill until they were tender. We served the beef and hot vegetables with sliced tomatoes and corn on the cob. Although the meal was filling, everyone saved room for pie. The meal was perfect – fresh, healthy, and all produced within 100 miles of Dubuque.

Ready to try a farm-to-table meal? The Dubuque Farmers' Market kicks off the 2025 season on May 3 at 7 AM. �

Baseball may be America's game but for the 4,000 youth with disabilities who live in the surrounding area, the sport previously was out of reach. Most recreational facilities are not accessible and those with disabilities had limited opportunities to participate in a sports league, causing them to miss out on the camaraderie and skill-building aspects of being in a team sport.

nter the Miracle League of Dubuque – an organization centered on providing every child with a chance to play. In conjunction with the City of Dubuque, the Miracle League has provided facilities and continues to organize ongoing programming that allows children and adults of all abilities the chance to play baseball and enjoy an allinclusive playground.

Located at Veteran's Memorial Park (2790 Miracle League Drive, Dubuque), this complex features a completely flat, wheelchair-accessible playground and baseball field,

accessible bleacher seating, a picnic area, and a support building. The building includes ADA restrooms, a concession stand, classrooms, a multi-purpose room, storage for the baseball equipment, and a quiet room with various therapeutic sensory equipment for body breaks and regulation between play. The park is open from 7 AM to 10 PM daily. "For so many years, individuals had to sit on the sidelines and watch their friends play games that most kids do," said Janna Beau, City of Dubuque Recreation Supervisor who coordinates the Miracle League programming. "Now their friends get to come and

watch them on their turf, so this is their time to shine."

The Miracle League sponsors eight baseball teams in the fall and spring (pausing in the summer when the heat adversely affects players). The leagues are open to children and adults with any physical or mental disabilities that cause them to be excluded, whether intentionally or not, from conventional baseball leagues.

Each Saturday, approximately 80 players participate, and the number is growing every year. The spring leagues run every Saturday until June 21 with four games on the hour beginning at 8:30 AM.

"We welcome more participants," said Merle Santjer, Miracle League board president. "It would be a great problem to have if we had to find another day in the week, someday, because we needed more teams."

Games are designed to be about fun. Each game is one hour long and every player bats once each inning. All players are safe on the bases and every player scores a run before the inning is over. The last one up gets a home run, and each team and each player wins every game.

"Everyone plays all positions in the field. There may be 10 infielders," said player parent Jil Van Cleave. "That's the nice thing about this. All the players play."

Players are assisted as needed by Friends on the Field, volunteers who encourage the players, help them run the bases, chase balls in the outfield, and help keep players safe. Organizations, high school and collegiate athletic teams and individuals volunteer to be buddies.

"I always say sometimes the helpers leave with bigger smiles than the players. Everyone benefits," said Beau. "What's great is that we have siblings, friends, and neighbors come together and it's fun."

The Miracle League works to make the experience special for the players. Each player receives their own T-shirt and hat. Popcorn and water are available without charge at the concession stand. The scoreboard features fun facts about the players, and the mascot Homer adds to the energy. Miracle League announcer Clete Campbell is known for a bit of good-natured embellishment as each player comes up to the plate. Overall, it makes for an entertaining and heartwarming Saturday morning for all involved, spectators included.

Last year, Miracle League even helped replicate what it is like to travel and play on the road when they organized a Baseball Extravaganza at the Field of Dreams with games against Pittsburgh and Sioux City teams.

One of the regular players is Conner Van Cleave who claims the title "Mayor of the Field." Conner's dedication to trash pick-up, sweeping the bases, and keeping the dugouts clean earned him a part-time position doing those tasks when he's not on the field.

"I like to play the game, and I have friends there," said Conner. "It's really neat."

His mother also sang the praises of the Miracle League. "This league has been awesome. It really opened up a lot of opportunity for these special athletes," said Jil. "It's fun here and they excel. I can't say enough about it. It's been wonderful for Conner's social skills."

The Miracle League program engages more than the players. "It's a great family thing for us," continued Jil. "The group really misses each other throughout the winter months. All of us understand how life is with our special population. We have a connection."

Santjer's connection with the Miracle League unknowingly began when he sought a role

for his son Matthew, who is diagnosed with autism, as he was entering middle school. Santjer worked with the coaches to help his son serve as a volunteer manager which connected him to Tom Witry, former baseball coach at Hempstead High School.

Coach Witry saw an inclusive baseball field in Des Moines, and after his retirement, he worked with Santjer to explore the possibility of constructing a field in Dubuque. A small group served as a catalyst to galvanize many others to create the Miracle League of Dubuque.

"When we first started, it was for the baseball field only," said Santjer. "And then the more we met with parents and the city, it was, I don't know if we're thinking big enough here. What if we had enough space for a playground? Then what if we had enough space for a building so that we would have classrooms so that we could do programming when it's not nice outside?"

From 2013-2019, fundraising and design occurred and in June 2020 construction on the complex was completed, with the board electing to finance to do the project all at once. Since the effort began, nearly \$4.4 million has been raised for the project, and there are dreams for future expansion when funding allows.

The complex is a Public-Private Partnership with the City of Dubuque. The Miracle League initiated the planning and was responsible for fundraising and construction.

12007 190th St, PO Box 418 Monticello, IA 52310 The board then returned the complex to the city which now owns and maintains the property and runs the programs. Ongoing fundraising allows all aspects of the Miracle League to be provided without charge, from concessions to uniforms and equipment.

The Miracle League complex is the most utilized park in Dubuque as people come from miles around to take advantage of its facilities. There are approximately 325 Miracle Leagues around the country, all with different configurations, with the closest to Dubuque being in Davenport and Marion.

"There's not a Miracle League from Dubuque to Rochester, Minnesota. There's none between here and Madison [Wisconsin]. There's none between here and almost Freeport [Illinois]. So, you have all these families in between. We know that once they come on a given day and they have a good experience, they'll come back," said Santjer.

REGION-WIDE GENEROSITY



A Few Historical Threads of Holy Ghost Parish

Dubuque's Holy Ghost religious community dates to the late 1890s. The designer of the present-day church was the German born and Master Architect Guido Beck. Construction of Holy Ghost Church was begun in the summer of 1915, and it was subsequently

dedicated on July 4, 1916.

During the 1950s, the projected opening of Wahlert High School along with the expected population growth in the Kane Street area, prompted Holy Ghost officials to plan a modern elementary school. The proposed

school was to be located at 2981 Central Avenue with the architects being Durrant and Berquist of Dubuque. It wasn't until 1957 when the contemporary era began, and the completion of the modern school was realized.

By the 1963-64 school year, the new Holy Ghost School required the second floor thus maximizing the usage of the entire structure. Back in 1951, lay teachers were reintroduced to Holy Ghost. By the mid-1960s, the teaching staff reflected a balanced mixture of both Franciscan Sisters and lay people. By around 1965, Holy Ghost had developed into a flourishing parish of approximately 1,350 families. And with an enrollment of about 1,220 pupils, Holy Ghost School was the largest parochial elementary school in the city of Dubuque. �





WHAT'S IN THE BAG?

"The satisfaction of a job well done is our reward and what drives us to improve day by day"

n planning this month's wines, I was going to bring both a red and a white, but Angela was headed to the Twin Cities and offered to pick up a white (since I already had a red). Before the tasting, I asked her to drop the bottle by my house so I could take the article photo. She was a bit bummed as she stated, "then you'll see the wine and won't have to guess."

I told her to bring it in a bag and I wouldn't look, and I didn't. I took the photo leaving the wine secure in the bag and did not see it until after we tasted it and pulled it from the bag. You can see the bottle (now empty) below! The red wine this month, I read about in the *Drinking and Knowing Things* wine blog by Michael Amon, author of the book by the same name. If, after reading this article, you wish to order a bottle, call Family Beer and ask for Joshua. He can order and have it for you within about a week or so.

A point of information about TeamWines's tasting — most of the time we are tasting the wines blind. Meaning the bottles are bagged, so we don't see what the wines are prior to sampling and develop preconceived notions about what the wines may taste like. Of course, the person(s) bringing the wine will know but the others do not. We feel it's a better way to judge the wine fairly but also test our wine identification abilities.

The paper bag revealed a 2023 Mr. Brightside Gamay Noir Blanc (12% abv, \$18 Dolce Vita Wine Shoppe in Chaska, MN). What a fun surprise! Mr. Brightside winery was established by Tim Fulnecky in 2020 and is owned and operated by Tim on the Central Coast of California. The grapes were organically farmed, they spent 6 months in stainless steel, and no malolactic fermentation. The

wine had a clear, slight lemon peel yellow tint. It was clean and precise with fresh floral notes of citrus, honeysuckle, and a damp dish cloth with lemon scented dish soap on it (there was a dampness to the lemon scent). The wine had a medium light body with low acidity, offer-

ing just a slight grip on the palate. This wine went very well with our breaded mushrooms and crab cake offerings. It also heightened the flavors of our white cheddar and Manchego cheeses. We felt it would pair well with a mild chicken dish or a mushroom risotto.

Our red this month is a **2019 Dominio**Fournier Ribera Del Duero (14% abv \$31) This wine is 100% Tinta del País. Grapes have been grown in the Ribera del Duero region beginning over two thousand years ago when some Benedictine Monks left Burgundy and headed south into Spain. Tinta del Pais, also known as Tempranillo, is the primary grape in

this region which borders the Duero River (yes, the same one as in Portugal, just spelled differently). Sometimes you may see it referred to as Tinto Fina.

Dominion Fournier's vineyards are 2,550 feet above sea level. The soil is river gravel with excellent drainage. The grapes are hand harvested and go through a 5-day dry ice maceration and then malolactic fermentation. The wine is aged 12 months in French oak. If you like Rioja or Cabernet Sauvignon, you're going to enjoy this wine.

This wine was dark garnet in color. We picked up aromas of a cigar box, fresh leather, baked dark cherry pie/cobbler and a bit of

roasted pepper. We enjoyed these aromas a lot. On the palate, the cherry notes came through, but we also had cassis, pistachio, and a hint of cranberry chutney. Tannins were rather noticeable (medium-plus) but balanced. There was medium acid making for a pleasant mouth feel. Aidan, (son of Erin) our plus-one to TeamWine this month, noted the wine "stings a little" remarking on the acid. The wine had a smooth and somewhat lengthy finish. The wine paired well with olives and salty food. We all felt it paired nicely with the baked mushrooms, and the dried apricots and, of course, we all indicated it was splendid with the dark chocolate. Erin nailed

the region before the reveal by guessing the wine was from the Douro valley. She was thinking Portugal, but this was from along the Duero River in Spain. All in all, we each enjoyed the wine!

TIPS

It's time for picnics at parks and sitting on your back porch enjoying a glass of wine. Keeping a bottle of white chilled though can be a challenge. If you have a thermal sleeve, that is an easy solution. Another, almost as easy is to wrap the bottle in several layers of damp newspaper and then transport it in a plastic bag to your location of choice (just be sure it's a legal location). You can even leave it wrapped after you open it and it should remain cool throughout your picnic, even in the sun. This will work similarly on the back porch; a rubber band will help keep the newspaper in place.




