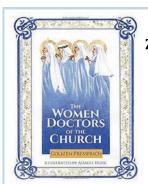

10 Surprising Health Benefits of

Drinking red wine in moderation has often been associated with health benefits — everything from helping to prevent heart disease and cancer to boosting memory and cognitive function. Early wine drinkers from centuries B.C. realized that wine was a safer alternative to water which often had questionable sources and dangerous bacteria levels. Ancient Egyptians and Greeks also relied on wine as a form of medicine. Today, although we don't use wine as medicine or worry too much about the safety of water, red wine is still a popular beverage with bonus health benefits.



utritional and scientific researchers across several medical professions have confirmed many of the health benefits of red wine as the result of data-driven research. Here is a summary of what they have to say along with where you can find additional information.

RED WINE AND CORONARY HEART DISEASE

Improving heart health is perhaps what we think of most often when considering the benefits of red wine. According to Mayo Clinic Staff, "The alcohol and certain substances in red wine called antioxidants may help prevent coronary artery disease, the condition that leads to heart attacks." How does this work? The antioxidant resveratrol, a plant compound with antioxidant properties that is found in the red grape skin and red grape juice, is thought to protect the heart's blood vessels by boosting levels of HDL which is often called "good" cholesterol. This, in turn, helps lower levels of LDL or "bad" cholesterol that is associated with an increased risk of heart disease and stroke. Other research seems to indicate that resveratrol might also reduce inflammation

and blood clotting, also lowering the risk of heart disease. ("Red Wine Consumption and Cardiovascular Health," Molecules, 2019.)

RED WINE AND BLOOD PRESSURE

Studies have shown that both systolic and diastolic blood pressure numbers improve after consuming dealchoholized red wine or wine with alcohol removed. In addition, grape wine extract has also been associated with lowering blood pressure, regardless of alcohol levels. ("Consumption of a Polyphenol-Rich Grape-Wine Extract Lowers Ambulatory Blood Pressure in Mildly Hypertensive Subjects," Nutrients, 2015.)

RED WINE AND CANCER RISK

Some medical studies indicate that red wine might help reduce the risk of cancer by preventing the growth of cancerous cells, especially those that lead to breast and esophageal cancer. Resveratrol can help starve cancer cells by denying the development of a protein that is essential to their growth. ("Contribution of Red Wine Consumption to Human Health Protection," International Journal of Molecular Sciences, 2018.)

RED WINE AND DENTAL HEALTH

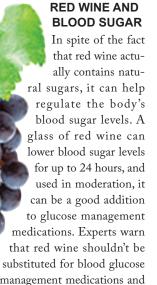
In addition to lowering the risk of heart disease and cancer, the beneficial antioxidants in red wine can also reduce the harmful bacteria found in the mouth – bacteria which sticks to teeth and gums and can lead to plaque buildup, tooth decay, and gum disease. ("Inhibition of Oral Pathogens Adhesion to Human Gingival Fibroblasts by Wine Polyphenols Alone and in Combination with an Oral Probiotic," Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry, 2018.)

RED WINE AND EYE HEALTH

Resveratrol's vascular-enhancing properties are thought to improve microcirculation in the eye. Improved blood flow in the eye can help prevent age-related macular degeneration, eye problems caused by diabetes, and even glaucoma. These eye diseases contribute to loss of vision. ("Resveratrol and the Eye: Activity and Molecular Mechanisms," Graefe's Archive for Clinical and Experimental Ophthalmology, 2014.)

RED WINE AND MEMORY/ COGNITIVE FUNCTION

Studies have suggested that the antioxidants in red wine may help improve short-term memory, reduce damage caused by lack of sleep, and boost the body's ability to learn and process information. In addition, red wine may lower the risk of dementia which often leads to Alzheimer's. These studies emphasize moderation in wine consumption and point out that heavier usage can have the opposite effect and increase the risk of impaired memory and cognition. ("Relationship of Wine Consumption with Alzheimer's Disease," Nutrients, 2020.)

RED WINE AND BONE HEALTH

The antioxidants in red wine have been linked to an increase in bone density and strength, lowering the risk of osteoporosis that can lead to weakened bones and fractures. Again, drinking too much red wine has the opposite effect and leads to lower bone density and strength. ("Gelatin versus its Two Major Degradation Products as Supportive Therapy in Experimental Colitis in Mice," Food Science & Nutrition, 2018.)

RED WINE AND GUT HEALTH

Studies have shown that the consumption of red wine may help promote healthy gut bacteria which can prevent disease and increase the body's immune function. ("The Effects of Grape and Red Wine Polyphenols on Gut Microbiota - A Systematic Review," Food Research International, 2018.)

RED WINE AND VIRUSES

Red wine's antioxidant properties can help boost the body's immune system which, in turn, can be important in fighting off viruses. ("Wine, Food, and Health," Wine Science, 2020.)

There you have it - ten reasons to take another look at red wine. The Dubuque area is fortunate to have several marketplaces and wineries that offer a variety of red wines.

Stone Cliff Winery in the Port of Dubuque is a popular stop for visitors and locals alike

- and the friendly staff offer several red wines that are sure to please. "We have one dry red - our Cabernet, but our best-selling red is our sweet Strawberry Rhubarb," said Jodi Bryson, tasting room manager/events coordinator. "We do have a bigger selection of red versus white wine."

Dyersville's O So Good Winery is another establishment that offers wine. "We have around fifty varieties of wine, including six dry, red wines - Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Shiraz, Pinot Noir, Malbec, and Diablo Rojo," said Lee Ostwinkle, president/ founder of O So Good Winery/Distillery. "Our best seller has been the Cabernet, but the Malbec and Diablo are the newest and doing very well in sales. We do sell more reds than whites." ❖

A new campaign facilitated by the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque and Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce – ENVISION 2030 – is an opportunity for people to share their ideas for strengthening the place they call home.

Increasing access to brain health care has become a major goal for the entire Dubuque region, and work toward that goal got a boost 20 years ago when community members named "brain health services" as a big idea that would improve life in Dubuque.

"Since then, we've seen many important, systemic improvements, and community-wide efforts that will continue long into the future," says Peter Supple, director of nonprofit relations for the Community Foundation of Greater Dubuque. Resources to help people in need access services have been introduced for schools and law enforcement agencies, while nonprofits have worked to reduce the stigma around brain health care.

These developments gained momentum thanks to ENVISION 2010, a community visioning campaign facilitated by the Community Foundation and Dubuque Area Chamber of Commerce in 2005, through which people were asked what ideas would help strengthen Dubuque for the future.

Today, the progress made toward these ideas has inspired the Community Foundation and the Chamber to reboot the visioning campaign for a new generation of Dubuquers: Enter ENVISION 2030. Beginning in March, community members will have the opportunity to submit their ideas for making Dubuque a community where people want to live, visit and do business for generations to come.

EVERYONE'S VOICE MATTERS

Anyone and everyone is invited to participate in ENVISION 2030. What makes the process successful is that it includes input from a diverse cross-section of people from across the community. Every person has ideas for what can make Dubuque better. We daydream about them, talk about them with friends and family, and share them on social media. ENVISION 2030 is an opportunity to make those ideas widely known and possibly put them into action.

There are many ways to submit ideas, including by going to dbqfoundation.org/envision2030 anytime through May 31. There's no limit to the number of submissions, and you can choose to either share them in writing or with a brief video clip. You can even share your idea on Facebook, Instagram or LinkedIn using the hashtag #envision2030.

Then, in April, the Community Foundation and the Chamber will host the Night of Ideas, an opportunity for the entire community to gather and share in person.

"No idea is too small, too ambitious, or too outrageous," says Nancy Van Milligen, president and CEO of the Community Foundation, who led the first ENVISION effort 20 years ago.

After the submission period closes, a selection committee will whittle down the ideas to a list of 100 semi-finalists. In June, the Foundation and the Chamber will host

a day of town hall gatherings across the community where people can vote on their favorites out of the 100 and narrow the list even further to 30 ideas.

Over the subsequent months, the selection committee will review the finalists and vote on the 10 best ideas, which will be announced at an event in October and published in local media and a booklet.

A COMMUNITY APPROACH

The final list is more than just ideas on paper. It is a way for all community members to rally around initiatives that will enhance the quality of life in the Dubuque region for generations to come.

After the Community Foundation and the Chamber published their ENVISION 2010 list 20 years ago, many people stepped forward to generously help bring the ideas to fruition. Among those people were the members of the Schmid family, who took notice of the idea for a community health center that would specialize in providing high-quality, affordable health care, particularly for uninsured patients. The Schmid family's \$1.3 million gift created an endowment that continues to provide annual operating funds for the center. Opened in 2007, Crescent now annually sees nearly 14,000 medical visits, 13,000 dental visits, and 8,000 brain health visits.

LISTENING AND LEARNING

Perhaps the most valuable aspect of the EN-VISION process is the camaraderie it brings out in the community.

"This is truly a people-driven process," Van Milligen says. "Listening to our neighbors about their needs, their hopes for the future, and their dreams for the community their children and grandchildren will inherit is the best way to ensure that the investments we all make in Dubuque today will make it stronger for tomorrow."

This is why the 10 ideas that came out of ENVISION 2010 have all been realized to some extent. (The idea for passenger rail service hinges on decisions that need to be made across the state line in Illinois.) Even ideas that did not make the top 10 have been implemented through the work of neighborhood groups, nonprofits and other passionate community advocates.

With the launch of ENVISION 2030, a new generation can shape the future of the Dubuque region. Like brain health services and a community health center, the next big ideas are out there. The first step toward making them reality is sharing them.

Dubuque Main Street-Promoting

"Main Street" impacts far more than just its namesake street. Main Street is an overarching term used to describe the central business district of a town, focusing on shops, restaurants, and social gatherings, Dubuque Main Street embraces that broad definition and serves as a nonprofit community development agency dedicated to the development and ongoing support of the greater downtown area as a place to explore, dream, and thrive.

ounded in 1985, Dubuque Main Street is the oldest, continuously running urban Main Street Program in the United States. Its mission serves 235 blocks in 10 districts throughout downtown Dubuque, ranging roughly from "bluff to river and bridge to bridge."

The organization operates following the four-point approach of Main Street America: design, organization, promotion, and economic vitality. Each year for the past 40 years, Dubuque Main Street has been reaccredited by the national organization for demonstrating their adherence to these pillars.

The four points work together to enhance the aesthetic, cultural and economic aspects of downtown. Design supports the visual and physical assets of the district. Organization is achieved through a strong foundation of Dubuque's leadership working together to provide partnerships, resources, and community involvement. Promotion celebrates the culture and sponsors events to bring people into the area, and Economic Vitality creates a supportive environment for entrepreneurs and existing businesses.

The Main Street program was started in Washington, D.C., by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Dubuque was one of the original seven cities chosen to pilot the effort and the only one to be continuously accredited. Because of its roots, historic preservation is an essential component and fits well with the city's priorities and interests.

Dubuque Main Street has worked on

streetscape verification, façade grants, landscapes, and helping the entire area increase its visual appeal. The Iowa Economic Development Authority recently awarded a Main Street Iowa Challenge Grant to convert an outdated strip mall-style building into Slanted Dubuque indoor climbing facility, restoring individuality to multiple storefronts while maintaining the building's historical significance.

Main Street Dubuque provides core programming in three areas, the largest being the organization of the Dubuque Farmers' Market. This will be the 180th year of the market which served over 50,000 visitors from more than 300 zip codes last year, welcoming people from Alaska to Massachusetts. While the market itself is seasonal, work on it continues all year with an off-season advisory group that evaluates the program and recommends changes. Thanks to this group and a DRA grant, this year's market will feature new seating options for people to enjoy their food or to rest, and a new directory with maps and brochures to help guide people to its growing list of

The Market also serves as a business incubator, where vendors can test their products in a weekly booth, graduate to a permanent presence, and ultimately open a storefront in the downtown district, as happened with Elevated Images, Annie's Heirlooms, and Limerick Candle Company. Businesses like Endless Fragrance have shown that the Market also serves as a way for existing storefronts to introduce their businesses to a wider Dubuque audience.







"What makes us unique is our ability to lead public outreach, to go into a small business and to make ourselves accessible to them and communicate our offerings and services to them in a way that's digestible,"

"And then we engage the public in the small business community – that's really where we can make the most difference."

The second tranche of programming is grant funding. Since 2002, Dubuque Main

Street has funded \$853,000 in challenge grants. Last year, Dubuque Main Street also awarded façade grants to local property owners and \$100,000 in SWAP grants to projects such as Centrally Rooted, Bliss Ice Cream, River City Hair Co., Las Margarritas, and Ludovissy & Associates. A new grant will be offered this year to assist with the marketing of recurring events and to help promote Dubuque's best celebrations.

"There are things small businesses can take advantage of, but it can be a confusing web of programming and services. So, we connect with small businesses and entrepreneurs, build trust with them, and walk through how to engage with our programming. We build allies, our network of supporters, and prove

that we're here to help people," said Barba.

execute the Arts For Us fashion show which attracted over 200 people," said Thompson, owner of Bri X Creative Studio.

"Then they helped me out in every capacity of establishing a business. They helped me with a new business grant opportunity, mentored me on how to run a business, connected me to resources – they were a great necessity," said Thompson. "They have done a phenomenal job in helping minority

businesses and I am extremely grateful for Dubuque Main Street."

The third core area of services is Downtown Discovery Days, including Puttzin' Around Dubuque mini-golf tour, Music on Main/All that Jazz concerts, and Holidazzle Small Business Saturday trolley loop.

"I like to say they're right-sized events to get you in the doors of businesses and to kind of explore downtown Dubuque, have fun, and meet people. Sometimes what the public needs is an excuse to come downtown," said Barba. "And we're helping the registers ring for these small businesses which is really the purpose of the events."

It seems to be working. Entrepreneur Brad Cavanagh notes: "Dubuque Main Street is such a strong contributor to the success of small business in Dubuque, especially as a coordinator of big community events. We took over "A Ripple Effect" in Cable Car Square last year and the day of the Holidazzle event was our biggest day of sales for the whole year. Success like that simply wouldn't be possible without the help of Dubuque Main Street and their dedicated staff."

Holidazzle will return along with a full roster of events for this year, featuring such staples as Architecture Days in May, Food Festival Fridays in Washington Park May through September, and the State of Main Awards in October. Other events planned for 2025 include the St. Patrick's Day Pub Crawl in March, and a 40th anniversary block party and Tax-Free Weekend Sidewalk Sales in August.

Dubuque Main Street is led by a volunteer board of directors who work in conjunction with its staff of three and a cadre of volunteers. Those interested in supporting the Farmers' Market or other events are welcome to express interest. As a nonprofit, the organization relies on sponsorships, grants, and individual donations to support its work.

A Look Back at Dubuque in 1969

n 1969 America's WW2 generation was at the helm and the Baby Boomers were coming of age. It was a time when the country was embattled over the Viet Nam War and yet, at the same time, America flexed her technological prowess by landing U.S. astronauts on the moon. At the same time Dubuque, Iowa was experiencing a myriad of community-wide events.

Dubuque city government was structured differently in 1969. As the year started, Dubuque's new mayor was chosen by the city council. In January, Walt Pregler, the new mayor, boldly predicted— "a great deal of urban renewal." Secondly, a new central fire station was on the drawing board. He also addressed extensive redevelopment of real estate along the Iowa Street corridor. It was announced in November of 1969 that the state of Iowa condemned Dubuque's old city jail. And to add to the city's woes, City Hall suffered arson. Yet despite these setbacks, City Hall hired its first computer analyst in October.

As Dubuque prepared for the downtown central fire station, plans were underway for the new west end fire station along J.F. Kennedy Road opposite Key Way Dr. The Powers family sought legal action against the city concerning the land for the building. Two major fires plagued Dubuque in 1969. The first was the Rainbo warehouse disaster occurring in early February. Estimated damage was nearly \$500,000 (\$4.3 million

in 2024). The second fire was the old Eagle Supermarket fire at 200 S. Locust Street in December.

The First National Bank opened a branch at JFK and Wacker Drive with a small temporary trailer before officially breaking ground of the present-day (2025) US Bank. Two other bank branch offices opened nearby. In late February, DB & T's branch in the Kennedy Mall parking lot experienced groundbreaking. It would open for business in mid-September and in August the American Trust branch (present day, 2025 Midwest One Bank) on JFK Road conducted its grand opening.

Many other construction projects were also occurring in our community. The Town Clock Plaza pedestrian mall was being designed. The Mississippi floodwall was 40 percent completed. The Mercy Hospital campus experienced demolition and expansion. The new airport terminal opened later in the year featuring Ozark Airlines as a carrier. Construction began of the Reserve Center near the airport that summer. Other projects included the Iowa Street Parking Ramp, the YMCA and Hempstead High School.

Just prior to 1969, the Dubuque Packing Company employed nearly 3,500 workers and the John Deere plant required roughly 4,300 people. Also, in mid-June of 1969, union plumbers and sheet metal craftsmen organized a strike against management that lasted about ten days. In September of 1969, the dedication of the Union Temple took

place at 1610 Garfield. By late summer, a wildcat strike involving 3,500 employees happened at the John Deere Dubuque Works.

As 1969 began, John Deere in Dubuque started to experience explosive growth. Despite this economic broadening, controversy arose later in the year. In July, the city of Dubuque wanted to extend the city limits to include John Deere. The company responded with stiff resistance and a showdown developed as an October referendum was scheduled. Deere and Company placed a full-page ad in the city newspaper on September 26 urging Dubuque citizens to vote against the City's proposed annexation. The October 7 vote resulted in a defeat for the City of Dubuque. It is probable, that if the referendum to annex John Deere was decided, John Deere would have eventually left the Dubuque area in the 1970s.

Dubuque's only television station, KDUB an ABC affiliate, was publicly introduced in September. At this time touch tone telephones became available to city residents and quickly became popular. Across from the newly constructed Kennedy Mall, there was a drive-in theater where the former Zayre/Venture/Shop Ko store would later be built. The fledgling Dubuque community of Latter-Day Saints held an open house at the downtown YMCA at 11th and Iowa streets. Track star and 1936 Olympic Gold Medalist Jesse Owens spoke at Senior High School in the spring semester.

A 19th Century schoolhouse traveled down Pennsylvania Avenue and throughout town to be delivered to its destination—the Ham House grounds in June. It was at this time that Stephen Hempstead High School was being built. This modern secondary school was named after an early governor of Iowa, from a committee headed by George Freund. This committee member would later become the Telegraph Herald's 1989 recipient of the First Citizen Award.

On St. Patrick's Day, 1969, the Irish flag proudly flew on the Loras College Campus near Keane Hall. A collegiate competition to raise money between the Germans and Irish resulted in an Irish conquest! •

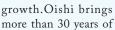

KALMES RESTAURANT OFFERS OVER 160 YEARS OF TRADITION by Cassie Cate

Quaint is the perfect word one can use to describe the charming town of St. Donatus, nestled on Highway 52 between Dubuque and Bellevue. Amidst breathtaking scenery, this tiny dot on a map is known for its status as a Luxembourg Village-having a large population of immigrant settlers from the Luxembourg Village in Germany, the Gehlem Barn-the oldest barn still standing in the state of Iowa, and Kalmes Restaurant-a popular destination for over 100 years.

Back in the early 1850s, Peter Kalmes used the tiny village as the birthplace of a small bar in a pebble stone building across the street from what is now Kalmes Bar. In 1933 Theo and Stella Kalmes adapted the business when they purchased the land to build a small bar and gas station, becoming the current location of the restaurant today. A few years later in 1942, the grocery store and living quarters were added. Windy and Helen Kalmes bought the business in 1956 and later added the dining room in 1982, followed by the addition of the Luxembourg Dining Room in 1995.

The restaurant pays homage to its Luxembourg roots and the people of the surrounding village, with its nostalgic décor of old photographs and vintage charm. History and family roots run deep in this business, as is evident with the traditions that still live within its walls.

Currently, Kalmes Restaurant is owned and operated by the fourth generation Jim and Lori Kalmes, Brian and Barb Kalmes, and Jodi and Willie Hingtgen. Jimmy Jr. is the fifth generation Kalmes in the business, running the ins and outs of the catering side of the restaurant.

When you walk into Kalmes Restaurant you take a step back in time, reliving the nostalgia of the Supper Club, surrounded by old photo-

graphs and the history of family and friends. Inside the door is a small grocery store providing convenience to the surrounding area, with baking needs, paper products, cleaning supplies, and various meat products. This ease of access is just part of the small-town charm of St. Donatus.

Kalmes is open Tuesday through Sunday for breakfast, lunch, and dinner- Tuesday-Thursday from 10 AM to 8:30 PM, Friday from 10 AM to 9 PM, Saturday from 7:30 AM to 9 PM, and Sunday from 7:30 AM to 7:30 PM. Each day offers a different special to diners. Tuesdays serve up four pieces of broasted chicken with mashed potatoes and gravy. Wednesdays grill up an eight-ounce ribeye and choice of potato. Thursdays offer a ham steak or hamburger steak and onions with a choice of potato. Fish Fridays give the choice of catfish or cod and of course small or large prime rib. Saturdays also offer prime rib or ribs. Sundays round out the week with a huge buffet, serving various favorites for all diners.

Breakfast at Kalmes Restaurant includes traditional Midwest fare, such as omelets, eggs, potatoes, pancakes, and homemade sausage. It's a great way to start the day, sipping coffee and getting to know the local community. On Sundays a breakfast buffet gives a fresh start to the day for those seeking variety.

The lunch and dinner menu at Kalmes Restaurant is wide-ranging and leaves the diner with hard choices to make. The meal can start off with appetizers, like the standard wings or poppers, or go more traditional with chicken livers. Of course, Kalmes offers their wonderful salad bar to start the meal off right, featuring cinnamon rolls- a tradition Helen Kalmes started that continues to this day. Other salads and a daily soup are also on the menu.

There are over twenty-eight sandwiches to choose from on the menu! The family says hamburgers are great sellers, and they even have a bison burger for the more adventurous diner. They also have pizza burgers, olive burgers, patty melts, jalapeno burgers, mushroom and Swiss, and the Windy Whopper. Fish sandwiches, grilled cheese, prime rib sandwiches, ribeye sandwiches, and Reubens are just some of the others one can choose. Pizza is another option, including a ham and sauerkraut as a nod to the German heritage.

Dinners all include a choice of potato and salad bar. The Pork and Poultry section of the menu cooks up ribs, ham steak, broasted chicken, and chops. There are also chicken livers and various other chicken options and combinations, such as chicken and ribeye, shrimp, or ribs.

Seafood is another menu section, with all varieties of shrimp, catfish, cod, scallops, and even a seafood platter. These seafood options can also be paired with ribs and steak. Kalmes Restaurant grills up a large variety of steak, including filet mignon, bison steak, ribeye, and prime rib. Perhaps the most unique menu items are those with the nod to the traditional Luxembourg Cuisine, including the Luxembourg Ground Steak, Pork Sausage Sandwich, and Wiener Schnitzel Veal.

Kalmes Catering is also a big part of the business. Kalmes Restaurant does just about any event you could imagine for almost any size. Those looking for this service can design their menu based on the wholesome food diners experience that diners have come to expect from the restaurant. All the food is prepared at the restaurant and taken out to events in the surrounding areas of Dubuque. The catering business is busy, often serving up to three to four events in an evening. Some

WINES TO GET YOU THROUGH THE REST OF WINTER!

"Wine doesn't have to be expensive to be good – wine makes food taste better- and it's fun!"

7 ou might not need to "Beware of the Ides of March", but you will want to seek either, or both, of this month's wines. TeamWine truly enjoyed both our white, an Albariño from Oregon, and a red from the Douro Valley of Portugal. We found these wines to be wonderfully food-friendly and easy on the pocketbook.

SIPS

Freya Cellars vineyards are located in the Chehalem mountains in the North Willamette Valley in Oregon. The name is in honor of the Burgundy region of France where great Pinot Noir comes from and a tribute to the Scandinavians who settled in northern Oregon. Freya, is for the Norse Goddess of love and fertility. She is the patron of crops and birth, the symbol of sensuality. Freya Cellars is a father and son business dedicated to creating artisanal Pinot Noir and Albariño wines from vineyards planted in 1988. The 2022

Albariño (13% abv, Sid's Beverage, \$18.99) was so enjoyable to drink. The wine is nearly colorless with just a hint of lemon yellow. Aromas included pineapple, lime, a touch of coconut and some early blossom floral notes. The wine had a light to medium body and a noticeable, yet pleasant, acidity. The Albariño went extremely well with the tinned trout (it was really good) the hard cheeses and the marinated veggies we had. It did not pair well with any of our sweeter appetizers. Surprisingly, it did not go so well with hummus. Overall, to a person, we enjoyed this wine!

Mary Taylor is a name you will want to get to know if you enjoy quality wines at a reasonably price. A statement from the website reads, "Today, it is our mission to unlock the world of European "appellation" wines by working with individual growers in multiple villages— from Bordeaux to Nîmes to Valençay— who produce exceptional, regionally-distinctive wines at extremely accessible prices." We poured and tasted the 2015 Douro (14% abv, EJ's Wine Shop, \$22). The Douro Valley of Portugal produces some superb wines, and this wine comes from vineyards near the village of Pinhão. This wine is a blend of Touriga Nacional 60%, Tinta Roriz 25% and Touriga Franca 15% from 50-80-year-old vines. This wine had an inky ruby color that looked rich in the glass. Aromas of plum, dark black fruit, cassis, saddle leather, pipe tobacco, smoke and the mustiness of an old library. The mouthfeel was unexpectedly light, yet very agreeable. The wine had perceptible tannins...a bit grippy, yet the wine seemed very balanced. I learned this wine is foot stomped, yes, they still do that in much of Portugal and was fermented in stainless steel. This was quite food friendly as well, though it didn't pair well with the pistachios, and it overpowered the trout. It paired nicely with the hummus, chocolate (of course), and the cheeses. This would pair well with a pasta dish, an egg-plant parmesan or a light pork dish.

TIPS

It's March and most of the cold weather is behind us and time to consider stocking up on lighter wines for Spring and Summer events. There is nothing like enjoying a glass of your favorite white or lighter red wine while on the back patio or front porch. Begin now to think about what events you have coming up and make a list of wines you want to have, or maybe new ones you want to try. Almost any wine store will give you a better price cost per bottle if you can get a case, or a half-case in one purchase. The merchant may not have it advertised but ask and I'll bet you'll get a nice percentage off. Then, you simply need to make sure you store them until you are ready to enjoy them. Keep the bottles in a cool dark place, free from drafts and vibrations (under steps isn't always a good spot). If you are planning on enjoying most of the bottles this year, they don't have to be stored on their sides. Standing up will be fine for the short term. A good protocol for wines is, if the whites are stored in a refrigerator, take them out about 30 minutes before drinking. If reds are stored at room temperature, put them in the refrigerator for about 30 minutes before drinking. Other than that, plan ahead and enjoy your selections! Let me know your favorites, Team Wine just may want to review them.

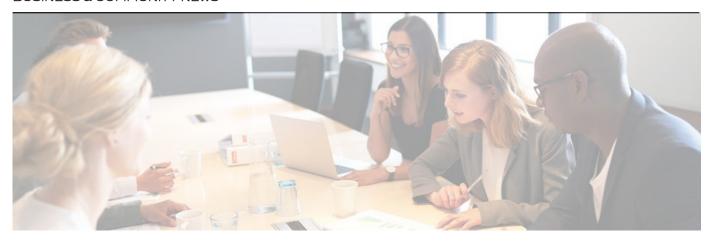

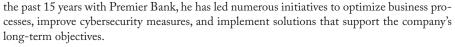
