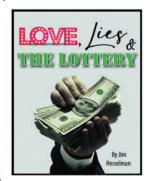

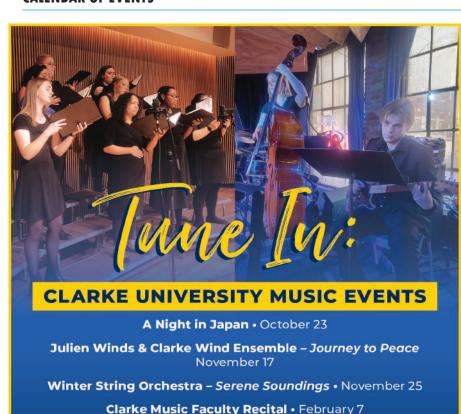

# EMBRACE YOUR OLYMPIC DREAMS WITH THE DUBUQUE CHORALE

Five rings, a torch, and the sound of a fanfare—these are some of the most recognizable symbols of the Olympic Games. The Games themselves symbolize international friendship, human excellence, perseverance, and teamwork. In celebration of these ideals, the Dubuque Chorale, their chamber choir Cadenza, and both Dubuque Chorale Children's Choirs present their fall concert, Olympic Dreams.

The Olympic theme is fitting for 2024, not only due to the recent Summer Olympic and Paralympic Games in Paris, but also because this year marks the 100th anniversary of the Winter Olympic Games, which began in the Alpine town of Chamonix, France in 1924. In celebrating this milestone, this concert invites the Dubuque community to reflect on how the spirit of the Games can inspire us in all aspects of life.

Dubuque Chorale Artistic Director Dr. Amanda Huntleigh says, "Olympic Dreams is about committing to work toward a goal with hope. It is about dreaming what might be possible..., finding inner strength to work toward it, and sticking it out, especially when it is challenging." The same spirit that drives Olympians can inspire people to pursue excellence in all their endeavors, including the arts. According to Dr. Huntleigh, "All expertise requires tens of thousands of hours of practice to achieve. That is true for elite athletes and professional musicians alike."

The practice of music and sport both require dedication to training the mind and body, as well as working as a team to achieve a common goal. Victoria Bausman, director of one of the Children's Choirs, says that one aspect she loves about choral music is that it requires collaboration, "Each person's voice, each person's practice and participation matters, but it's what it adds to the group that is the main focus."

Throughout the history of the modern games, music has played a special role, from sound tracking events like figure skating and the newly introduced breaking, to celebrating the cultural identity of the host nation. Several pieces of music also serve as symbols of the games, from Spýros Samáaras's "Olympic Anthem," composed for the inaugural modern games in 1896, to 20th century compositions like Leo Arnaud's "Bugler's Dream," John Williams's "Olympic Fanfare and Theme," and the titular theme from *Chariots of Fire*.





Iconic performances from the history of the games inspire athletes and spectators alike to embrace the Olympic spirit. The Children's Choirs will remind audiences of one such performance with their rendition of Gloria Estefan's "Reach." "It is an iconic tune that brings me back to 1996 whenever I hear it,' says Karmella Sellers, program director for the Dubuque Chorale Children's Choirs. "Music and sport are two fields where grit, determination and practice are needed to succeed... I hope [this] becomes a song of encouragement for our singers." Audience members will also recognize fanfares and familiar Olympic themes performed by trumpeter Amy Dunker as part of the transitions within the program. In addition to songs performed at the games, the concert features music that captures the Olympic spirit, such as "Go the Distance" from Disney's Hercules and "Heroes," by David Bowie and Brian Eno.

# William Intriligator — The Maestro's 25<sup>th</sup> Season with the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra

By his own admission, when William Intriligator auditioned to become the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra's Music Director in 1999, he was "very young and naïve," but his selection turned out to be the perfect fit for the Maestro himself as well as for the community.

his year, Intriligator is celebrating 25 years leading the Symphony as Music Director and Conductor, far surpassing the "three to five years" he predicted his stint in Dubuque would last.

"I didn't anticipate falling in love with Dubuque and Dubuquers and starting my family here and raising kids here, and it just being a really perfect fit,"

"I also didn't anticipate that the orchestra could grow as much as it's grown and that it would continue to want to innovate and take all my crazy ideas and imagination and make it happen."

Intriligator has much to be proud of during his quarter-century with the orchestra, presenting numerous operas, ballets, rock concerts, Classics and pops concerts, and musicals. He also has made a steadfast commitment to promote local composers, performers, vocalists, and dancers as well as to host educational programs. Two notable performances in the coming season include Beethoven's *Fifth Symphony*, the orchestra's "signature piece" that Intriligator conducted in his first concert after being hired here, and a full production of *Swan Lake* ballet with the Heartland Ballet.

The Maestro has helped shape the orchestra

through the hiring of all but two members. "We are fortunate to have outstanding musicians," he said. "I have more confidence in the orchestra now than when I first arrived, and I know they are at a high level."

Its not just the orchestra that has grown. "I have a deeper connection to the music, and my music-making has become more mission-driven. It's about service and helping music touch people's lives," he said. "Music has a bigger purpose and can help heal and unite. People of all backgrounds can be moved by the pieces we perform."

While the Music Director is required to deal with behind-the-scenes logistics to put on major productions, Intriligator finds ways to infuse joy into all his responsibilities. He feels passionately about the music, and it shows through in all his interactions.

"It has stayed fresh because it feels like we're constantly innovating," said Intriligator. He has his sights set on doing another opera in the future and would like to have the orchestra accompany a full-length feature film among other possibilities he is considering.

"I have big dreams, and I have to tone them down to fit those dreams into reality and the budget. It's a perpetual struggle!" he said. Fortunately for Dubuque, for the past 25 years, Intriligator has found ways to bring many of his dreams to fruition. Here's to another few decades of his passion benefiting our community.

# How Might the 2024 Presidential Election Impact Markets? History May Offer Clues



The 2024 presidential election is quickly approaching, and investors may be wondering if and how the outcome will impact the stock market and underlying investments. While every campaign cycle comes with its unique set of circumstances, we can turn to history as an indicator of how markets typically act in an election year. # HISTORIC TRENDS IN ELECTION YEARS

In general, market volatility trends higher early in an election year as candidates are being finalized and then again as the election nears, as investors react to the ebbs and flows of the news cycle and grapple with the unknown of what is to come. Following election day, as the winner becomes clear, market volatility levels tend to normalize<sup>1</sup>.

#### THE IMPACT OF INCUMBENCY

The candidate pool for presidency can further impact markets and volatility trends. Typically, volatility has been higher in election cycles where there has not been an incumbent in the running. Stock market returns have also been more favorable in years when an incumbent has been on the ballot, than when two non-incumbents have



faced off<sup>1</sup>.

#### **POLICY CHANGES**

Historically, market returns tend to be stronger in the first two years of a returning president's term as investors have experience with the administration's policies. Returning administrations generally have more experience navigating political barriers and may be better equipped to see policy through. How much any presidential administration

can accomplish is limited by policymakers in Congress and local and state legislatures – and their political party make-up is a pivotal detail of election years. History has not been as kind to markets as the administration's second term passes its halfway point. During these last two years, there is limited time to implement policy, and investors and the American public may start looking ahead to the unknown policies of a new administration, becoming more sensitive to fiscal and policy uncertainty as the next election draws near<sup>1</sup>.

# BOTTOM LINE: STICK TO THE FUNDAMENTALS AND INVEST FOR THE LONG TERM

Political cycles can be intimidating to investors as they look to prepare for the uncertainty that comes with the election year and beyond. Regardless of the political backdrop, financial markets are principally driven by growth in the economy, corporate profits, and the direction of interest rates longerterm. Importantly, fluctuations in markets are normal, and it is usually beneficial to stick to the fundamentals. A diversified portfolio with a mix of different investments selected according to your goals and risk tolerance is key to avoiding potential overexposure to unnecessary investment risk. Diversification helps investors mitigate risks in their portfolios that may be caused by geopolitical circumstances, election volatility, or policy changes.

It is normal for emotions to run high as you anticipate the uncertainty that an election, or an administration's policies, may have on the economy or your portfolio. # DUBUQUE'S 2 NURSING SCHOOLS PROVIDED DECADES OF CAREGIVERS

he Finley Hospital School of Nursing was established in Dubuque in 1896. Just four years later in 1900, the Mercy School of Nursing was organized by Mother Mary Agnes, RSM. Both schools filled a need and provided the city with compassionate, well-trained nurses well into the late 1900s.

# THE FINLEY HOSPITAL SCHOOL OF NURSING (FHSN)

FHSN, one of the first six nursing schools in Iowa, offered a three-year course of study. The first class of four graduated on January 10, 1900, and each new nurse received a round gold pin bearing the inscription "Finley Hospital Training School" on an outer blue ring with an enamel cross in the center. On this date, there were two classes in the school with a total enrollment of fifteen.

In May 1924 the public was invited to an open house at the Lull-Burch Memorial Nurses' Home located on Allison Street. The four-story building, located southeast of the hospital, was built in an L-shape. The building not only housed Finley nursing students but also included classrooms.

In 1938, FHSN closed due to a surplus of nurses and low student enrollment. The onset of World War II reversed the trend and in June 1942, the school reopened, enrollment got underway, and a new class of future nurses began in September.

FHSN operated under the regulations of the

Iowa Board of Nursing Examiners. The school entered an affiliation with the University of Dubuque so nurses could attend classes in subjects required by the state board. The course load was rigorous and included physical education, dietetics, chemistry, and psychology. The course load was considered somewhat more than was required by student nurses enrolled at the University of Iowa. Admission to the FHSN required graduation from an accredited high school. Students in the lower third of their graduating class weren't accepted without additional study and proof of ability.

Judy Bredlow Edmonds graduated from Dubuque Senior High School in 1957. She knew she wanted to become a nurse, so she enrolled at the FHSN immediately after graduation. "The first year, most of our classes were held in the Lull-Burch Memorial Home," she recalled. "That's also where we lived. We had to clean our own rooms. I still remember them telling us 'If you clean the corners of a room, the center will always get done' and 'Nothing on the floor but your feet and the furniture.' They were pretty strict."

"The doctors taught most of those classes," Judy said. "Then we walked over to the University of Dubuque for anatomy, physiology, chemistry, and courses like that. They put us on the hospital floor almost right away. We were on call too. They really worked us with going to school, working on the floor, and

doing homework. But we had a lot of fun. Even when we were on call and got called in the middle of the night, it was exciting."

Today's nurses aren't required to wear a uniform, but that's not how it's always been. "Our uniform was a blue and white striped dress and over that we wore a white, heavily starched apron with a top that hooked on," said Judy. "It took some time to hook the apron together, so we did it the night before. Our white caps were also heavily starched."

In September 1977, FHSN lost its accreditation from the National League of Nursing. After upgrading and increasing classrooms, formalizing staff development plans, and changing required courses, the school regained its status in June 1978. The accreditation was valid until 1986 and was extended until 1987 when the last class of seniors graduated in May of that year and the program came to an end.

The Finley Hospital School of Nursing Alumni Association was founded in 1913 to honor the traditions, history, accomplishments, and legacy of the FHSN. Although the Alumni Association folded earlier in 2024, the FHSN Alumni Association endowment continues to fund scholarships awarded to women and men in nursing.

# ST. JOSEPH MERCY HOSPITAL SCHOOL OF NURSING

Dubuque's St. Joseph's School of Nursing, later known as Mercy Hospital School of Nursing, in 1900. In 1902, the first class of nurses graduated. The following year, the nursing education program was lengthened from two to three years.

On June 16, 1905, the Dubuque Enterprise offered a description of nursing duties, "Some of the special duties after acquiring the stripes are learning to serve meals, under supervision, and night work. The latter usually tests the nerve of the candidate and if she serves successfully through night work, she is apt to finish the course."

In 1922, a two-story nurses' home was dedicated on Langworthy St. The home filled quickly as three classes were admitted annually. Student nurses received board, laundry, lodging, and stipends of \$5.00 per month. During the last two years, the stipend increased to \$7.00. In 1935, a gymnasium and classrooms were added to the nurses' home.

In 1938, the Mercy School of Nursing expanded with the addition of the Clinton School of Nursing. In 1943, the School of Nursing was established as the Division of Nursing of Loras College. Completion of three years led to a certificate in nursing education. Five years of study including two years at Loras and three years at Mercy resulted in the Bachelor of Science degree in nursing.

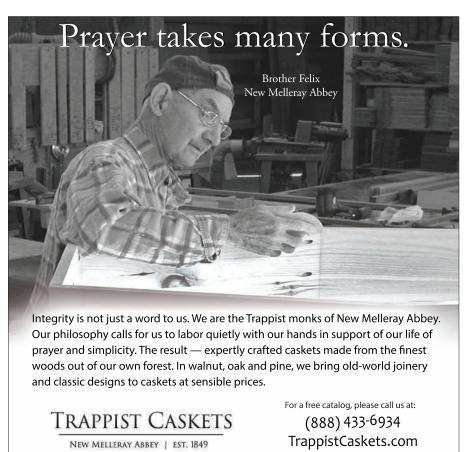
In the 1950s, the Mercy program disaffiliated with Loras, although courses were purchased from the college. In 1964, all arrangements with Loras ended, but in the fall of 1965, courses were first accepted from Clarke College and the nursing program was shortened to three years. In 1970, the program was again shortened to two years.

In 1973, the last class was admitted to the Mercy School of Nursing. The next year, Area One Vocational Technical School assumed all responsibility for that last class. In 1975, students received an Associate in Applied Science Degree with a Mercy Medical Center School of Nursing recognition diploma.

Finley and Mercy Schools of Nursing trained nurses in Dubuque for decades, educating and graduating hundreds of registered nurses who went out into communities to offer essential, professional, and compassionate nursing care.

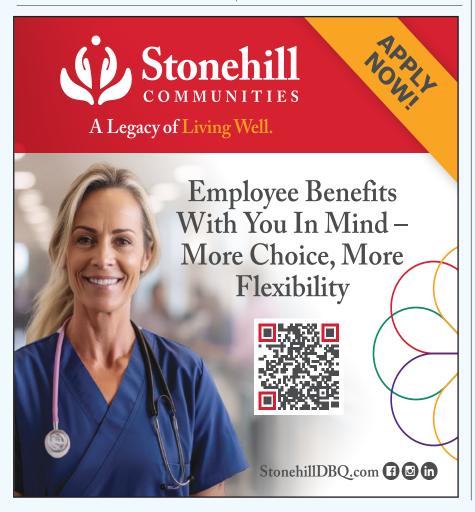

to handle. Simultaneously Gino's Pizza located next door closed its doors. As the saying goes, one misfortune is another's fortune, and the two used the need for a larger kitchen and the opportunity to expand to create the new concept of Driftless Pizza.

The name Driftless pays homage to the Dubuque region left untouched by the glaciers creating the incredible topography that makes the town and surrounding areas a sight to be seen. This region is unlike any other, which Simmons discovered after leaving the flat farmland of his Des Moines childhood. Living in McGregor for a time helped him develop his love for the landscape made up of the river valleys and hills blanketed in various greenery and rock formations.

According to Simmons, pizza was the logical choice for the menu because the ovens were already in place, and even though Gino's was not a longstanding location, people still like pizza.

With no formal culinary background, Jake and Kayti spent eight months developing the dough recipe they use at Driftless in their home kitchen until they found the perfect recipe.

With a background in research science and a knowledge of brewing beer, Simmons embraced this challenge. As the founder of Backpocket which brews locally in Iowa City to serve it's Des Moines and Dubuque locations, the couple was confident they would make the pizza concept of Driftless a success.

With pizza being such a broad topic, they knew Driftless needed something to set it

apart from other restaurants offering this staple. After months of developing, Jake and Kayti settled on two different styles of pizza: Detroit and New York. Simmons does, however, say the pizzas are "inspired by" these styles because they have taken some creative liberties in putting their own twists on the two styles, appreciating the flexibility that comes with this well-loved cuisine.

An all time favorite, New York style pizza is what Simmons refers to as a "medium" crust. This style of pizza has been a staple for decades and gives a traditional pizza experience to those desiring a thinner crust. Known for its foldability, this pizza has a classic sauce with a blanket of mozzarella.

Detroit, on the other hand, boasts a very thick pan crust and has not had much fanfare until recently. Sitting on top of a thick, airy bottom, this pizza is surrounded by fried Wisconsin Brick Cheese. Although there is a completely different shape, style, and fermentation to the crusts, either can serve up the same delicious topping choices the diner chooses. As for favorites, Simmons says there is about a fifty/fifty split on which people order showing they are both delicious!

Driftless offers the traditional toppings of pepperoni, sausage, and veggies for the less adventurous diner. Pizzas can also be designed specifically to the taste of the customer with their specific topping choices in mind. For those wanting to branch out and try something different, the couple has created some unique flavor combinations bringing pizza to a whole different level. One unique combination that has become one of the top three sellers is Figgy the White. With its garlic sauce base, it is topped with feta, prosciutto, caramelized onions, and a swirl of fig drizzle. Another unique option is the Hot Honey delivering

the garlic sauce base topped with a cheese blend, sausage, feta, and hot honey drizzle. Expecting these unique fares to be lower sellers, Simmons says these specialty styles have offered the most robust feedback from customers.

To start the meal off right, Driftless serves up salads and appetizers, as well. Pizza Bites, Mozzarella Sticks, Burrata, and Bruschetta will get the taste buds ready for the main event. For something lighter, the Caesar Salad or Bistro Salad are great options.

Not everything is savory at Driftless. Diners can also indulge in a sweet treat with a shake that appears more like a work of art. Served in a glass mug, the shakes come filled to the brim and spilling out the top with whipped cream, syrups, sprinkles, and, of course, the cherry on top! For a more classic sip, customers can enjoy a vanilla or chocolate shake. To mix things up, there are a cookies and cream, strawberry cheesecake, and smores shake, which are all sure to impress.

Something unique to Driftless that Simmons wants the customer to know is the convenient sisterhood it shares with Backpocket. Both, although separate entities, are run under the same umbrella and operate together to serve customers in a convenient way. Tabs are shared between the two, as they operate under the same ordering system, so customers can move freely between the two with one tab, making an outing double the fun. 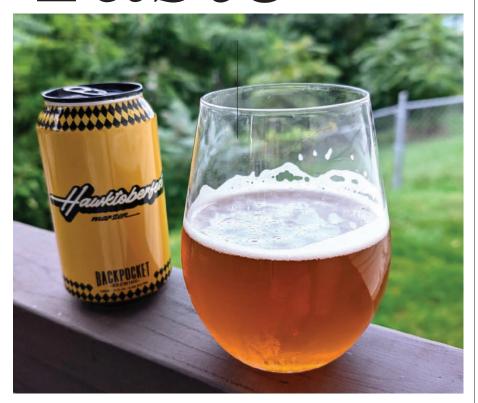

## WHAT WE'RE DRINKING: HAWKTOBERFEST

**ABV: 5.3%** 

Who Brews It: Backpocket Brewing

Where you can find it: Most liquor stores, and at Backpocket Dubuque

Expected Price: \$11.99 or \$12.99 for a 6-pack of 12 oz cans

There are many signs of fall in Iowa. Tree leaves fade from green to myriad shades of yellow, orange, and red. A crisp chill can be felt when the wind picks up, prompting you to search for the jacket or flannel shirt you hid away when it was 90 degrees with 80 percent humidity. When you walk into a store, you're shocked at the staggering weight of pumpkin spice. If you stop by a local brewer, chances are you'll find a new type of beer on the menu: the Märzen.

The Märzen, more informally known as an amber lager here in America, is a type of

European beer commonly associated with Volksfest. Oktoberfest, which is more recognizable to Americans, is the largest Volksfest in the world, happening each year in Munich. However, a Volksfest can be any size and requires two things: alcohol tents (typically beer or wine) and carnival rides.

Hawktoberfest, the beer from Backpocket Brewing we're looking at in this column, clearly derives its name from Oktoberfest. It embodies the telltale signs of a Märzen and European brewing in general. When you pour a glass of Hawktoberfest, you'll immediately notice the pure amber coloring. A good pour will have minimal head. If you've seen photos of waitresses carrying frothy steins of beer at Oktoberfest, don't feel that the festival attendees are getting ripped off. These steins are larger than your standard glass to accommodate the head that forms

with a quick pour.

Taking your first drink, you'll taste notes of toast and graham crackers, then slighter notes of toffee as you swallow. There's little carbonation - the beer goes down smoothly. When compared to a European Märzen, Hawktoberfest tends to be a bit lighter and is closer to a pale lager than one would expect from a Märzen. Still, the beer has a very low bitterness, so if you're someone who shies away from hoppier beers, there's no need to worry about Hawktoberfest. It's an easy-to-drink beer that's hard to turn down, and the signature black and gold cans have become a staple at Kinnick Stadium tailgates prior to Hawkeye football games for good reason.

Diving deeper into what makes up Hawktoberfest, it uses the following malts and hops.

Munich malt will cause a strong orange or amber coloring in your beer. It promotes a sweet, toast-like taste in beer.

Pilsner malt is lighter than Munich and is responsible for bringing Hawktoberfest closer to a pale lager in terms of taste.

Hallertauer Mittelfrüh is one of the noble hops of European brewing. Noble hops are known for being high in aroma while low in bitterness. It brings a signature, earthy aroma to any beer it is used in.

Perle is a popular, modern German hop that shares many characteristics with the noble hops. It's found in a wide variety of German lagers.

### You'll like Hawktoberfest if you enjoy the following types of beer:

- American lagers (Budweiser, Coors, Miller, etc.)
- Pale ales that don't emphasize hops.
- Pilsners

Hawktoberfest is a great starting point if you've been curious about craft beer but are unsure of where to start. So next time you find yourself overwhelmed with pumpkin spice, try sipping on a Hawktoberfest. It's a great way to enjoy fall in Iowa.

## WINES FOR THE HUNTER'S MOON

When it comes to wine, I tell people to throw away the vintage charts and invest in a corkscrew. The best way to learn about wine is the drinking. —Alexis Lichine

eamWine met at the home of Erin & Shane on a Monday night. I brought the wines, and a smorgasbord of snacks was brought by others. Being October I felt it appropriate to have an orange wine, instead of a white, and a red. The Kiki & Juan Orange wine, from EJ's Wine Shop, was from Spain and the red wine, obtained at Sid' Beverage, was a GSM by Quady North from Oregon. Both were enjoyable wines, though quite different.

#### SIPS:

We began with the **Kiki & Juan Orange** wine (12% abv, \$23). It is from Utiel-Requena, Spain, which is in the Valencia region in the eastern part of Spain. The grapes used for this wine are 90% Macabeo, and 10% Sauvignon Blanc, which are co-fermented.

The winery has several small vineyard plots scattered at high elevation which produces acidic, yet crisp wines. Grapes are hand harvested and destemmed prior to pressing to retain freshness. It gets an almost iridescent orange color, from sitting on the skins for a period of time.

TeamWine commented first on the lovely golden/orange tint of the wine. We deduced that it needs to come out of the refrigerator about a half-hour before drinking. We didn't do that and there was very little aroma until it warmed a bit. We had hints of strawberry, rosemary and herbal fragrance on the nose, but very light. Medium to high acid was sharp on the palate. We all remarked that we felt the wine was better with food. The cheeses and nuts helped to temper the acid-

ity. Once the wine warmed a bit the aromas were more plentiful with hints of cinnamon, lemon, and minerality. We felt this would be good with an opening salad, or maybe a shrimp cocktail.

The red wine was a 2020 GSM from Quady North (13.7% abv, \$29). It was made in Jacksonville, Oregon, which is in the southern part of the state, in the Rogue River valley. GSM stands for Grenache, Syrah and Mourvedre, the three grapes used in the wine. This is a small family operation begun in 2003 when Herb moved his family north from California. The first vineyards were planted in 2005, and they plant additional acreage when they can. 2020 was a very warm and dry year. It was also the year of the most destructive wildfires in Oregon. While they had some smoke, they found that smoke from the fir, oak, pine and madrona trees (natural smoke – as opposed to smoke from buildings etc.), did not have the noxious compounds of man-made structures and their grapes showed no negative effects.

The color, once again, struck TeamWine. This red was a lovely claret/light garnet hue that showed well in the glass. Aromas on the nose included cherry, leather, red berry, and not surprisingly a hint of smoke. This wine had a medium body and soft easy tannins. The wine went well with our olives, all the cheeses, especially the Feta, and the salty foods. We enjoyed it with both the milk and dark chocolate. We all felt this wine could be consumed by itself, or with food. White meat, such as a grilled or oven pork roast, would pair nicely. This is one we all wanted to enjoy again!

#### TIPS:

I just returned from a trip to the Adirondacks, which is where I grew up and still have friends. The main impetus for the trip, however, was a wine dinner, sponsored by the Adirondack Land Trust, held at Rolling Hills Estate Winery in Westport, NY. I share this to suggest to you to be adventurous. We have several wineries within an easy drive (Westport, NY, is not an easy drive) that offer wine dinners. Some provide their own chefs; others may bring in celebrity chefs from nearby eateries to pair food with the winery's wines. Check them out and make it an event. Get lodging and make it an overnight stay. You'll meet others who have an interest in wine, or food, or both. Dinners are likely al fresco, and that can make for a spectacular evening.

## FOUNDATION AWARDS \$250K IN GRANTS

In the inaugural year of the annual Nonprofit Grant Program, the Dupaco Foundation awarded \$250,000 in grants to support 29 nonprofit organizations in Iowa, Illinois, and Wisconsin. ### DMS DIRECTOR CHOSEN FOR SCHOLARSHIP

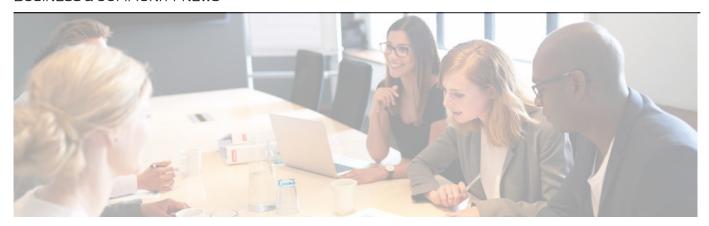
