

Competition

Bluff Strokes Paint Out is a competitive event for artists. Prior to Friday evening's Patron Party, \$15,000 in prize money will be awarded for top paintings. A key goal at Bluff Strokes' founding was to attract artists to Dubuque with its wealth and variety of painting opportunities. Specialty Award categories were selected to highlight various aspects of Dubuque: Mississippi Overlook, Riverfront, Historic Dubuque, Industrial, Arboretum/Garden, Rural Scene, and Street Scene.

The Plein Air Painting Movement

Plein Air (on site) painting is a popular and growing national movement. Artists paint on site and "in the moment," directly experiencing their environment and weather through painting, which is a very different experience than studio painting. Its popularity has fostered competitive paint outs throughout the country and created a market for workshops to help develop

skill levels. Since it's beginning Bluff Stokes Paint Out has become a major event on the Midwest Plein Air Circuit, attracting artists who have won national awards and been featured in national art magazines.

Buying Local Art

Plein Air painters show us our community "through artist eyes." They teach us to look at scenes we see every day in a totally different way. A painting by a Bluff Strokes artist is a memory – of a familiar scene made fresh, a visit with an artist, a time and place to

which we can return through art. Bluff Strokes has introduced many local residence to the joy of buying art for their homes and offices and living with those memories.

New this year – Bluff Strokes is now Bluff Strokes Art Center! Bluff Strokes was founded in 2014 as an Affiliate of the Dubuque County Fine Art Society to organize art workshops and a Plein Air Paint Out in Dubuque. Its mission was to attract artists to Dubuque, to help develop local artists, and to promote Dubuque as an artist community. Over ten years as an all-volunteer organization, Bluff Strokes has conducted 17 high level artist Plein Air and studio workshops featuring nationally renowned painters and attracting about 40% local artists and 60% out of town artists as participants. Plein Air Painters of Dubuque and Dubuque Urban Sketchers both emerged out of these workshops. Bluff Strokes Paint Out has grown into a premier regional paint out and attracts artists from around the country. Dubuque is "on the map" in this large and growing community of painters.

As of May 2024, Bluff Strokes Art Center, a 501(3)(C), has a permanent location at 12th and Locust Street. Bluff Strokes Art Center will continue to attract high quality artists to "paint Dubuque," and revenues will now help support their expanding offerings. Bluff Strokes Art Center plans are featured in a separate article in this issue.



Opens in Dubuque



The new Bluff Strokes Art Center is located at 1201 Locust Street in Dubuque

Bluff Strokes Art Center, a new nonprofit located in the former St. Mark Youth Enrichment building at 1201 Locust St. in Dubuque, is excited to offer residents of the tri-state area a wide variety of art programming, expanding the city's lineup of art-related activities.



If the Bluff Strokes name attached to the Art Center seems familiar, it's because it's also the name of the annual Bluff Strokes Paint Out which is now one of the Bluff Strokes Art Center events. Look for 55 artists visiting the city September 29-October 5 from all over the country as they "paint Dubuque" and exhibit and sell their art at Steeple Square on October 4 and 5.

Why does Dubuque need an art center? "We see this as adding to the cultural offerings that Dubuque already has," said Jillayne Pinchuk, president of the Bluff Strokes Art Center. "The city already does theater, music, and dance really well. There are so many opportunities with sports. The arts are represented in the schools, and yet the kids who really get into it don't have enough opportunities outside of school, so then they are doing it on their own and finding things online. We are trying to offer a space where so many different things can be explored right here in Dubuque."

Jillayne knows from firsthand experience that an art center can be inspirational to kids. "I grew up outside of Minneapolis and had access to one of the satellite locations of the Minneapolis Art Institute and always had art as part of my childhood activities. So every Saturday for about ten years I would go down to the art center. I never even touched paint. It was all drawing. It was formative in the way I grew up, in the way I thought,

in the people I met. Part of my confidence came from that exposure to art."

Plans call for the Bluff Strokes Art Center to offer art instruction provided by visiting artists as well as local instructors. Look for programming that includes art history and art philosophy as well as hands-on creating. Art programming will be offered for all age groups and all income levels. Jillayne emphasized that creating art is more than just drawing or painting. "It could be fabric arts, sewing and embroidery," she said. "We want to see all sorts of creators expressing themselves. But we are not ceramics and we are not metal working. We want to see the space used for learning whether you have a pencil or brush in your hand or not."

The Bluff Strokes Art Center will be overseen by a board of directors that has a wide variety of community perspectives. Rachel Daack has been hired as the Art Center's executive director. Rachel is a social scientist with a strong art background along with extensive experience working with local nonprofits. "My job is making sure that other people get to do art and that's critical to me," she said. "I get to lead an organization that's going to open the doors and create much more art access to either people learning how to make art from the beginning to very advanced stages and learning how to take their art to the next level and what that might mean to them."

One of the major goals of the Art Center focuses on collaboration with other organizations like St. Mark Youth Enrichment, the Dubuque Area Arts Collective, and other organizations. "I've been meeting with 15 artists and art organizations in the community to find out what services and support already exist and where people are seeing gaps," said Rachel. "I've been looking at about 30 other art centers to see what they are doing and how they are doing it. I don't want to copy anybody. I want this to be about what Dubuque needs."

Work to renovate the Art Center to welcome artists is ongoing. The landscaping and exterior lighting was refreshed within the first 24 hours of taking possession of the building. What remains to be accomplished is plaster repair and painting of the large upstairs space. "We are painting that space with a good color scheme conducive to creating art at all times of the day," said Jillayne. "There are also 3,000 square feet of space on the lower level that still gets good natural light and has a full kitchen. We envision and are excited to be able to offer communal artist work space down there. We also envision that a part of the Art Center will be gallery space - a place where art makers can sell their work. We expect to have regular retail hours."

The Art Center will host a soft opening with programming this fall. "People can


expect our initial instructional opportunities to include some kind of drawing class and a painting class for older youth through adults," said Rachel. "We're excited about the Art Center, but we feel we have to start slowly to make sure that we're doing it right. We want to make sure that what we're offering is super high quality and what the community needs."

Jillayne echoed Rachel's thoughts, "There are so many possibilities with what the Art Center could be. We're excited to explore as well as make sure that what we do, we do very well. I truly see a thriving art scene where people can express themselves as well as appreciate art as a necessity to a thriving community. It benefits business and generational retention. We want to see the kids who grew up here see a place that's vibrant and where they want to stay. Dubuque has natural beauty and many cultural offerings. The Art Center is something that was lacking. We are just filling in that gap."

"People say 'it will be great for kids to have this art opportunity," said Rachel. "And many adults say that they would have loved to have learned how to do art, but that they are too old to learn now. We want people to know that you can start art at any point in your life." You can do just that at the Bluff Strokes Art Center.

National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month

September is National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month, so designated to heighten recognition that resources are available for those with brain health needs as well as for those who wish to help them.



uicidal ideation is trauma, caused by crisis, stress, or PTSD," said Britni Farber, president and CEO of NAMI Dubuque. "When a person dies by suicide it is their worst-case scenario. Their emotional pain is so overwhelming that they just want it to stop - and they don't know another way to do it. They do not have the skills, tools, or resources to get that pain out of their brain." Death by suicide is the 11th leading cause of death in the United States, with over 48,000 people taking their own lives each year, just over 500 in Iowa alone. Those losses also affect the families, friends, colleagues, and neighbors of those who died and cause a ripple effect of sorrow throughout their community.

"It changes you when you have a person close to you with brain health experiences," said Farber. "You internalize the pain and realize that life is so delicate and we're not forever."

While males, and especially white males are statistically more likely to die by suicide, brain health challenges are felt by all segments of the population. Older adults are often overlooked and underserved but face chronic issues such as loneliness and transitions. They may have recently retired, lost their jobs or spouse, or moved to new

housing. "We focus on the population we see most often, but older adults are at incredible risk," said Farber.

The rural community is another population with a gap in brain health awareness. This month, NAMI began providing dedicated resources specifically to serve those from small towns west of Dubuque.

"It's also difficult to know where to ask for help; education and awareness in small towns are lacking and it can feel isolating to think you have to do it alone." said Elizabeth Marner, NAMI friends and family

Marner is beginning peer support groups and resources in the Epworth area, with the goal of having peer facilitators and family support specifically targeted for small communities. "There is more comfort when there are familiar faces, and you can find a village of resources. I want leaders teaching through their own lived and shared experiences," Marner said.

Another way NAMI is calling attention to brain health is by hosting its second annual Suicide Awareness Walk on September 8 at the University of Dubuque. The organization seeks to have 508 participants in its sunset event to represent the 508 lives lost in Iowa last year who were reported as died by suicide.

Farber wants the walk to help lessen the stigma around brain health and encourage people to open up if they have suicidal ideations. "Our hope is to put faces to these numbers," she said. "Having 508 people on

the track would represent mothers, fathers, friends, and bosses. The walk creates a humanistic component we lack because of the stigma."

While this month is designated for the national campaign, brain health awareness and destigmatization efforts occur all year long and encompass a variety of tools and resources for those in crisis.




To help people learn to identify their impulses and tendencies, NAMI offers peer support groups, education, wellness planning, and crisis planning so people can function as their best selves and avoid crisis situations.

For those at immediate risk, the most accessible resource is the national 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. By calling or texting that number, people can reach a trained crisis counselor to receive free, confidential support for those in mental health-related distress.

"People don't know what resources are available when they are in crisis," said Susan Ruden, MercyOne PHP nurse coordinator. "Suicide is often an impulsive act. Talking with someone often gives them the opportunity to slow down and reflect."

If time-sensitive, face-to-face intervention is needed, Foundation 2 Crisis Services provides a mobile outreach unit that delivers a free hotline chat and can dispatch an on-site crisis responder to arrive within one hour by calling 800-332-4224.

For those needing a higher level of assistance, MercyOne's Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP) provides outpatient treatment for 20 hours each week over two to six weeks in a group session format. This program, the only one of its kind in Dubuque, utilizes a holistic approach to integrate education with participant engagement and peer support.



"In this program, people become really invested in one another and affirm their worth. The illness drives us to isolate or withdraw and we often burn bridges, but the program empowers people with the tools and resources to restore their perspective."

Up to 10 participants engage in day-long sessions that build community, connect community resources, teach mindfulness, and infuse psychotherapy toward helping empower people toward brain health. The program has included sessions with occupational therapy, exercise movement, a pharmacist explaining medication side effects, and a chaplain sharing how spirituality plays a role in brain health. Community resources have introduced music therapy, nutrition, aromatherapy, art therapy, sound healing, meditation, yoga, tai chi, and volunteering.

"We help people with cognitive restructuring, instead of believing 'I just need meds'," said JoAnna Wolch, PHP therapist.

One client shared: "I left the program much more hopeful and knowing that my future is bright. And I have a toolbox full of healthy coping skills that I can use for a lifetime."

Another wrote: "The pain of losing [someone] will never go away, but now I know I can help myself and you guys have given us so many ways to do that."

The theme from providers to participants, is that help *is* available. "There is hope and help out there. You are not alone. Don't give up. People do care and are invested in you," said Susan Ruden.

If you are close to someone who is struggling, Farber recommends starting with a loving and kind conversation with that person to let them know you care. "Due to the stigma or not knowing how to help, people don't speak up and it seems as if they don't care or are dismissive. See the individual first, not the illness. Illness is not who that person is."

A Financial Guide to Inheriting a Home



f you stand to inherit a property, such as a family home or vacation condo, the gift presents a critical financial decision: whether to sell, rent or keep it. While the inheritance itself may be a blessing, often it's the result of losing a loved one who's passed away, which could complicate matters from an emotional and practical standpoint. Do you wish to hold onto to the property for sentimental reasons? Is it financially possible to maintain it if you already own or rent a residence? Do you own it outright, or is it a split inheritance with other beneficiaries (e.g., siblings) whose own financial situations and priorities will need to be considered?

Sorting through these and other questions can feel overwhelming, but don't let that stop you. As with most major decisions, it helps to start with the facts. Here are some steps to consider:

Set up an appraisal to learn the property's value. Hire a professional appraiser who can determine the fair market value of the property on the date you assumed ownership. Having a solid idea of the value can not only help you decide whether to sell or keep the home today, but it can establish a cost basis should you decide to sell it in the future.

Calculate the cost to maintain the property. If you decide to keep it, the property's mortgage payments, annual property taxes and utility bills will be your responsibility – but it doesn't stop there. Make sure to factor in other regular expenses, such as yard maintenance, snow removal, and housekeeping

to get a realistic picture of what it will take financially to keep the home. Also, if in doubt, check with your attorney to ensure there are no tax liens or other assessments on the property.

Determine your ability and desire to maintain the home. Do you have the time to handle the upkeep? Additionally, think about how you'll manage the property in retirement if you're unable to perform maintenance tasks yourself.

As you work through these actions, here are some additional considerations that come with the decision to sell, rent or keep the home:

SELL

Parting ways with a family home can be emotional – even when you know doing so is the right decision. Give yourself time to prepare the home for sale. This way you can sort through your loved one's belongings and find closure at your own pace. When the time is right, a cleaning company, home staging services and a realtor can help you put the property on the market. If you make a profit on the sale, apply the money toward your financial goals. The extra sum can help make your goals of retirement, college tuition for grandkids or estate plans a reality. Selling the home has tax implications that vary by state, so talk to a tax professional for guidance.

RENT

If renting the home is appealing to you, research what the rental market is like in your area. Determine if a reasonable monthly rental price provides enough cash flow to

cover upkeep costs. Hiring a management company to clean, make minor home repairs or manage the rental process may be attractive, particularly if the property is miles away from your primary residence. Additional tax considerations may apply depending on the number of days you use the home versus renting the space to others. Consult a tax professional to understand if and how your tax situation may change. You should also determine whether the property is subject to rental restrictions related to local ordinances and homeowner's associations (HOAs).

KEEP

The ability to continue family traditions, have a future retirement space or a vacation getaway may make keeping the home the right decision for you. If you're sharing ownership with a sibling or another family member, it's critical to clearly communicate (ideally in writing) how you will split the financial and maintenance responsibilities. If you inherited the home outright, the choices are yours to make.

Consider the following financial steps as

- 1. Purchase home insurance. If the property has a pool, trampoline, boat or other recreational items, you may need additional coverage.
- 2. Save strategically for a remodel or upgrades if you want to adapt the home to suit your family's lifestyle.
- 3. Update your estate plan. If you intend to keep the home in your family for another generation or two, don't wait to prepare your legal documents. Advance planning can help pass the property smoothly to your inheritors. Have a conversation with your beneficiaries so they know what to expect.

Making decisions after the loss of a loved one can feel overwhelming. It's okay to take your time and ask for help with choices along the way. Guidance from a realtor, attorney and financial advisor may help you be thoughtful about how the inherited home fits into your lifestyle and financial plan.



Patients suffering from migraines will need to seek a referral from their primary care provider before pursuing any migraine prevention treatment.








A GIANT GREEN KITCHEN ON WHEELS SERVES UP SANDWICHES AND SIDES

Have you ever found yourself wandering aimlessly, searching for something delicious to eat, nearing a state of anger because you simply can't find the right food to satisfy this intense hunger? If so, perhaps you missed one of Dubuque's newer food crazes: The Hangry Hobo Food Truck.

This giant green kitchen on wheels serves up sandwiches and sides of all kinds sporting the signature Hangry Hobo himself, complete with extra-large fork to devour anything chef and owner Nick Bries serves up. After almost a year in business, Nick confesses, "It's the best thing I've ever done."

With food trucks becoming the next big thing in the dining experience, Dubuque has seen its fair share cruising through town. In 2022, food trucks were a \$1.4 billion dollar market in the United States alone. For those looking to jump into the food scene but wanting to keep starting costs to a minimum, the food truck is a cost-effective way to jumpstart this venture. Also, with the influence of social media, food trucks can be easily located and advertised with little to no costs.

Nick didn't begin his life as a chef. In fact, his former career as a plumber was far from the day-to-day life of a food truck owner and operator, but, as Nick asserted, "It was too much digging holes." He knew it was time for a change, and food was something he was always excited about. Although he is very grateful to his former employer Miner

Plumbing for helping him literally get his food truck ready to roll, he continues to be confident in his decision to make a major career change.

The food scene is nothing new to Bries who regularly helped his brother, former owner of the Athenian Grill, with prep work and other various kitchen and restaurant tasks. Whether delivering food, prepping, or answering calls, he loved the business. Having a passion for food and the industry itself, Nick began typing names into the food truck database, trying to find one that suited him and that was not already on the move. After two weeks and declaring to his wife that he refused to leave the kitchen table

until he had a name for his restaurant on wheels, he got lucky keying in his name, and the Hangry Hobo was born.

Running a food truck has its ups and downs. Nick says the biggest down is the good old Iowa winter. The trailer can get incredibly cold, and the staff must don themselves in winter boots and coveralls to stay warm. Iowa summers are also a challenge, as the trailer can soar to over one hundred degrees! Bries, however, states the pros far outweigh these cons. Yes, working two shifts seven days a week can be taxing, but being your own boss has many rewards. And he is no longer digging holes.

Although Nick listed several positives, he continuously praised the team he works with for the success of the business. Without the help of his kitchen manager Adam, his son who has recently taken on more shifts, and all the other workers, he knows what he has already accomplished could not be possible. They are the best part of the whole endeavor according to Nick.

The menu offered by the Hangry Hobo is different from other trucks rolling through town. When asked how he created his menu

Nick simply states, "I know what people like." The Hangry Hobo offers several sandwiches and sides to choose from. Each sandwich is served with waffle fries, which can also be ordered separately, along with mini tacos, or the Hobo Poppers, his take on the jalapeno popper. These crispy poppers are wrapped in a wonton shell for a different spin on the classic original. Since the start of the year, they have rolled over 8,000 of these, proving customers love them! Another delicious side are the Gyro Fries, which are essentially an unwrapped Gyro on top of delicious waffle fries.

One thing many people in the Dubuque area have been very excited about is the return of the classic Gyro. This Gyro is the same recipe Nick's brother served at the Athenian

Grill, and the Hungry Hobo brought it back to life. The combination of lamb and beef has been lurking in people's minds for years, and many have been thrilled it has received a second life.

The best seller is the Ribeye Melt, which is topped with provolone, sautéed onions, and peppers. According to Nick, the deep-fried tacos are a must. Of course, they also serve their take on a smash burger, grilled cheese, and patty melt as a more traditional choice. There are also turkey and chicken wraps, along with a turkey melt.

If chicken sandwiches are your thing, the possibilities are many. Diners can devour a classic fried chicken sandwich, a chicken bacon ranch, a hot honey, or a Nashville hot

fried chicken sandwich. The truck's delicious black garlic mayo tops them all and adds to the foodie experience.

If you want to treat yourself to a delicious meal from the Hangry Hobo Food Truck, all you need to do is log onto their Facebook account each Sunday night to locate the whereabouts for the upcoming week. The schedule can be accessed by searching for either The Hangry Hobo on Facebook and/or Trail the Trailer Hangry Hobo. The mobile restaurant finds its way around the greater Dubuque area daily, and, in fact, they are already booked out for a year. Many times, Bries says places will call him to park at their business/company. They also do weddings and private events for those looking for a fun alternative to the traditional wedding and party cuisine. And, if the line is long, the weather is hot or cold, or you are simply in a rush, you can order online, so you just need to pick up your food piping hot and ready to go! Whether it be lunch or dinner, the Hangry Hobo is a satisfying option to squelch anyone's hunger.

OREGON WINES WITH A FUNNY NAME!

The wines that one best remembers are not necessarily the finest that one has ever tasted, nor the highest quality that may fail to delight so much as some far more humble beverage drunk in more favorable surroundings.

eamWine met around the winebox table at EJ's Wine Shop on a Sunday afternoon to enjoy and taste this month's wines. Our wines, both from the same Oregon winery whose winemakers are driven by the styles and methodologies of Germany. Teutonic Wine Company only grows and produces cooler weather varietals, which work well in Oregon's climate. They use natural farming practices and minimal intervention. Proprietors Olga & Barnaby Tuttle, have an interesting story of how they got into the wine business, but the end result is a nice selection of very refreshing wine.

SIPS

As is our custom, we began with the white, a 2022 Teutonic Gewürztraminer, a drinkable 12.5% abv from their Pear Blossom vineyard in Oregon. This wine was medium-bodied,

clear with a faint yellow tint. Aromas included pear, lychee fruit, candied citrus rind, white pepper and an herbal mint were all noted. Flavors on the palate were so pleasing. Sweet but not sugary, scents of poached pear, soft green apple, and lightly toasted cinnamon sticks presented themselves creating many oh's, ah's and yums amongst Team-Wine members. A very pleasing acidity and soft mouthfeel made this wine a star to us all. We didn't want the bottle to end. We felt this would go well with an opening salad, almost any appetizer for a summer meal. It paired well with our fig jam and crackers and could work with a range of tastes from sweet to salty.

We then moved on to the 2021 Recorded in Stereo red wine. This wine is a blend of Syrah with a little Pinot Meunier, Pinot Noir, and Chardonnay. The Syrah was sourced mostly from Eastern Oregon and then blended with the other grapes. The wine was made to honor a Pacific Northwest jazz drummer, Alan Jones. It had a clear, light garnet color with a hint of orange or copper color. We poured this and right away we all commented on the candy fragrance on the nose (almost Jolly Rancher red fragrance). While some cherry, cranberry and strawberry came through on the palate, it was not nearly as sweet as the nose would have indicated. Flavors yielded on the palate included rhubarb pie, candied cherry balls, hints of licorice and fennel, and freshly cracked pepper. This red paired well with our cheese plate, the candied pecans and the grilled asparagus with goat cheese. The wine had a lighter body than the white, yet the acidity was fresh and bright, and greater than the white. We felt that with the vivid color and crisp fruit flavors, that the wine likely went through a cold fermentation process, that retains those items.

TeamWine enjoyed both wines by Teutonic Wine Company. These wines are available at EJ's Wine Shop and if you mention this article, you'll receive 10% off on your purchase of either or both bottles.

TIPS

It's not too early to begin to think about wines for the holidays. I know, they are still a couple months off but if you order wine from a winery, or like a special wine that may have to be ordered by your favorite retailer, then it's good to get a jump on the planning. The major holidays are Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years. You may have a loved one's birthday or anniversary thrown in there, so there is no time like the present (get it...present) to think about what wines you wish to serve, or to surprise someone. Maybe this will mean a trip to Madison, Iowa City or Chicago for a bottle of wine or spirits. and only Press Forward chapter, the Community Foundation serves as a philanthropic resource for people and organizations who understand the revenue challenges news outlets face and want to increase their capacity to provide quality journalism around topics that matter in local communities. With this first Press Forward grant, the Community Foundation will empower local donors to build a sustainable funding stream that supports local journalism across the Dubuque region.

Press Forward Locals, like the Community Foundation, are a network of chapters across the country where funders bring new donors and foundations together to expand resources for local news. These 21 chapters are an opportunity for funders to create placebased initiatives, driven by the specific information needs of their communities. The foundation also hosts charitable funds that support journalism in the Dubuque region.

RIVER MUSEUM RECEIVES FUNDING

The National Mississippi River Museum & Aquarium received a \$5,000 grant award from Alliant Energy to support River Discovery Center phase one gallery renovations in the River Museum's William Woodward Mississippi River Center. The funding will support five new exhibits, a refreshed interpretation grounded in environmental history, integrate living and historic collections, and introduce new species. Exhibits will include new outdoor North American River Otter habitat, an aviary, the addition of new species of concern, and interactive learning experiences, all following Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) recommendations.

Phase one of the renovation project is currently underway and will be open to the public in the fall.

GRANT MATCH FOR HAM HOUSE

The Dubuque County Historical Society, which operates the Mathias Ham House, was awarded a \$270,000 Challenge Grant from the Jeffris Family Foundation after completing its fundraising efforts for the matching \$540,000 for the project through the Preserve the Wonder Capital Campaign. The \$810,000 will support the restoration, preservation, and interior improvements to the house and its mechanical system.

The Jeffris Family Foundation was established in 1979 by Bruce and Eleanor Jeffris, and their son Tom. The foundation assists the development of historic sites for nonprofit organizations in small towns and cities in eight Midwestern states: Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, and Michigan.

The areas of focus will be the historic windows, sash, doors, storm windows, plaster repair, painting, carpentry, bathroom remodels, plumbing, and electrical. Stickley Morton Architects and Gronen Restoration are assisting on the project. Surveying work has already begun at the site and restoration will begin over the next several months.

The Jeffris Family Foundation has also supported local Dubuque projects such as the Steeple Square renovations.

OVER 32,000 LBS. DIVERTED FROM LANDFILL

The Dubuque Metropolitan Area Solid Waste Agency (Agency) conducted a household

hazardous materials, latex paint, batteries, and electronics scrap mobile collection event on June 15 at the City of Dubuque Municipal Services Center. At the event 32,582 pounds of material was collected and diverted from ending up in the landfill.

At the mobile event, 9,948 pounds of household hazardous materials, 11,868 pounds of electronics, and 10,766 pounds of latex paint were collected from 310 Dubuque County residents. The hazardous materials will be processed for fuel blending or incineration. Latex paint, batteries, and electronics will be recycled and processed into new materials.

The Agency offers no-cost drop off for household hazardous materials, latex paint, batteries and most electronics (TV's and monitors have a \$15 per item fee) at the regional collection center located at the Agency's Landfill for Dubuque and Delaware County residents by appointment only.

DUPACO MORTGAGE RATE RELIEF

Dupaco Credit Union is partnering with the Federal Home Loan Bank of Des Moines (FHLB Des Moines) to offer a new program, Mortgage Rate Relief. This program provides eligible members with a rate reduction on their mortgage.

The Mortgage Rate Relief program provides \$25 million in grant funds to those seeking affordable homeownership. This product is designed to make homeownership attainable for borrowers at or below 80% of the Federal Housing Finance Agency's (FHFA) Underserved Areas Data, by permanently reducing their interest rate by approximately two percentage points lower than the current market rate.

This program is available for eligible homebuyers, regardless of their location, who may be just beginning their homeownership journey or looking to reduce their existing rate.

NICC'S NEW DEGREE PROGRAMS

Northeast Iowa Community College (NICC) announced two new Associate of Arts transfer degrees, Digital Media and Journalism, designed for students to earn their degree, transfer to a four-year university education, or to advance their professional

The new programs allow graduates to seamlessly transfer their credits into a Bachelor of Arts degree in journalism. Graduates of the journalism program at NICC may transfer to Drake University, Grand View University, and the University of Northern Iowa. Digital Media graduates may transfer into the University of Northern Iowa's program. The programs are flexible and can be completed on campus or online.


