How to Tap into Your HOME EQUITY

Home values have skyrocketed in recent years. And if you're a homeowner, you might wonder how to take advantage of this burst of equity.

(Hint: Equity is the part of your home that belongs to you, not your lender. It's often the difference between what your home is worth and what you owe on your home loan.)

JUST HOW MUCH HAVE HOME VALUES CLIMBED?

According to a new report from Corelogic, home equity jumped to nearly an all-time high in the first quarter of 2024. Nationally, homeowners saw their equity increase by 9.6% for an average gain of \$28,000.

Because the jump in equity is an average, those with home loans in some states like California experienced much larger equity increases by \$64,000, while those who owned homes in Iowa recorded average equity gains of \$13,000, the CoreLogic data showed.

"A low supply of available homes for sale put upward pressure on home prices and kept many homeowners in their current homes, which, in turn, fueled a remodeling boom," CoreLogic reported.


One advantage of having more equity in your home? You might be able to use that money now to help you reach other goals. Through careful planning, a home equity line of credit can be a powerful way to tap into the equity you've built. Learn how it works—and what to consider before making this money move

WHAT'S A HELOC?

Many homeowners take advantage of their increased home equity through a home equity line of credit, or HELOC.

A HELOC is a revolving credit line that allows you to borrow money against your equity as needed while you still live there. You can use the funds for whatever you'd like: Consolidate bills, fund home improvement projects or pay for other expenses.

Think of the home equity line of credit as a safety net. If you don't have a specific need—or are unsure if you might have other needs down the road—the funds are there in case life throws the unexpected your way. And because you're using your home as collateral, this loan typically offers much lower in-



terest rates than personal loans or credit cards.

A HELOC is considered a second mortgage on your house. You're using your home as collateral. That means if you default on your repayment, you risk losing your home. So, it's even more important to make your payments on time, every time.

HOW MUCH MONEY CAN BE BORROWED

Like every loan, HELOCs have eligibility requirements. The amount of money you can take out through a HELOC will depend on your home's total value, how much you currently owe on your home loan and other factors.

HOW TO REPAY A HELOC

LOAN >>>> REPAYMENT

Repayment works like a credit card—borrow what you need, pay it off and borrow again. At Dupaco, you have ten years to advance money from your line of credit. Each time you take an advance, your monthly payment recalculates over 15 years.

In theory, you could leave the line of credit untouched for nine years, then take a full advance and have 15 more

years to repay those funds. Your monthly payment can change, triggered each time you make an advance.

You'll pay a variable interest rate based on the Prime Lending Rate. With the current economic climate, recently rising interest rates will likely increase your HELOC interest rate. But you are only charged interest on the funds you use. And interest rate fluctuations only impact your monthly payment when you make a new advance.

If you plan to sell your home, you'll need to have your line of credit paid in full and closed for future advances.

Terms may vary at different financial

institutions, so you need to investigate them thoroughly and decide which is best for your situation.

CHECK AND UPDATE YOUR HOMEOWNER'S INSURANCE

If your home value has recently increased, it's also worth reviewing your insurance coverage if you haven't done so in a while. Your homeowner's insurance policy was likely purchased when your home was worth less than it is now. So, your coverage might no longer be enough to cover the current replacement costs of your home. •

How to Build a SOLAR READY

Home

hen you are building a new home, you can install solar from the beginning, helping you to save thousands of dollars in utility costs over decades. Solar installation costs have fallen over the past several years and when coupled with renewable energy incentive programs, now is a great time to go solar and start taking advantage of the energy savings.

Here are some reasons to consider solar in the design and building of your new home along with some particulars to consider during the home design process.

BUILT-IN FINANCING THROUGH A MORTGAGE

Including solar as part of a new home mortgage allows you to combine two payments into one. The added amount in the monthly payment will be at least partially, or in some cases, completely offset by the savings on your electricity bill every month. Adding solar to a new construction home in many cases makes financial sense. Additionally, homeowners can also tap into a low-interest home equity line-of-credit should you choose to add or expand your existing solar energy system as your family's energy usage grows.

Increase the Life of Your Roof

A roof-mounted solar array adds a layer of protection to your new roof,



helping protect the shingles from weather elements, thus helping to extend the usable life of the shingles. Solar Panels are mounted to aluminum rails. The rails are then mounted to shingles using flashing designed to be elevated and encapsulated to prevent water intrusion.

DESIGN ELEMENTS FOR A SOLAR-READY HOME

Roof Design

One main attribute for the design and engineering of an optimal roof-mount solar array is the placement of the array on a south-facing rooftop (195° +/-90°). Additionally, consider your preference for the panel location(s). Panels can be mounted on east or west-facing rooftops; however, the south is always preferred for maximum sun exposure. The optimal roof pitch is a 7/12 pitch to maximize year-round production.

Shade-Free

Secondary to the direction of a roofline is the amount of shade cast on the array once it is mounted to the roof. The ideal space should maintain a clear window of the sun from 9:00 am – 3:00 pm throughout the year to

maximize production.

Obstruction-Free

Structural rooftop elements such as chimneys, vent pipes, dormers, and skylights should be avoided (if possible) on the roof face where the solar array will be mounted. If the home design allows, keep them toward the ridge and/or to one end of the roof.

Conduit

The best time to install solar specific conduit for a roof or ground solar array is during the construction phase of your new home. For easy solar installation place a 2 metallic conduit from the attic to the location of the load center to be used for DC wiring. A ground-mounted solar array will often tap into the home next to the exterior utility meter.

Ground Arrays

Try to keep public and private utility lines out of any possible trench pathway from the location of the array to the utility meter. The ideal space for a ground array is a flat area south-facing with a little shading to have maximum production. The size of the area varies based on the number of panels

needed to offset your electricity consumption.

Electrical/Utility Areas

Leave approximately four feet of wall space on either side of your electrical load center for placement of the solar inverter(s). Additionally, leave three feet of wall space on either side of the utility meter for a required utility disconnect. Most arrays can be connected in the electrical load center of the home with our recommendation of a 225 A Square D Homeline load center with a 200A main breaker. A residential solar array will typically need two free slots on the opposite end of the bus bar from the main breaker.

COMMUNICATIONS

The solar array inverters require an internet connection for online monitoring services. For the easiest connection, place your internet router near the load center of the home. •

THREE EASY STEPS TO DECLUTTER A HOME

BEST WALK-IN BATHTUBS FOR 2024

or mobility challenged individuals, a walk-in bathtub can be a terrific option to consider because they're much easier to get into and out of than a standard tub, which also helps prevent falls. Here's what you should know, along with a reliable resource to help you choose one.

AGE-FRIENDLY TUBS

Walk-in bathtubs are uniquely designed tubs that have a watertight, hinged door built into the side of the tub that provides a much lower threshold to step over (usually 3 to 7 inches) compared to a standard tub that's around 15 inches.

Most walk-in tubs have high sidewalls, usually between three and four feet high, and are between 28 and 32 inches wide, but will fit into the same 60-inch-long space as your



standard tub without having to reconfigure the room.

In addition to the low threshold, most walk-in tubs also have a built-in seat, grab bars, anti-slip floors and anti-scald valves. Some tubs also come with handheld showerheads and quick drains (that drain the tub in under a minute), and many higher-end models offer therapeutic spa-like fea-

tures that are great for individuals with arthritis and other ailments.

The best kind of tub for you will depend on your needs, preferences and budget, and the size and layout of your bathroom. But be aware that walk-in bathtubs are not cheap. Prices range anywhere from \$3,000 to \$10,000 or more for the tub and installation costs.



INSURANCE AND AID

Because walk-in tubs are not considered durable medical equipment, original Medicare does not typically cover them nor do Medicare supplemental (Medigap) policies, but some Medicare Advantage plans may help pay.

If you're receiving Medicaid, many states have Home and Community Based Services that may provide some assistance. Or, if you're a disabled veteran, the VA has some home modification grants that may help pay.

There are also grants and loans available through the U.S. Department of Agriculture that help elderly, low-income residents of rural areas make home modifications, which may be used to pay for a walk-in bathtub. And, depending on where you live, there may be local programs that can help like Habitat for Humanity or Rebuilding Together.

To find out if these options are

available in your area, contact your Area Aging Agency (call 800-677-1116) or a nearby center for independent living at Ilru.org.

If, however, you can't locate any financial assistance and you can't afford to pay upfront for a walk-in tub, most manufacturers offer financing so you can make monthly payments. You should also know that if you're using a walk-in tub for a specific medical condition, you may also be able to deduct the costs of the tub from your taxes as a medical expense.

BEST WALK-IN BATHTUBS

beauties for the holidays. Then keep the blossoms coming all winter long. Plant several different types of amaryllis bulbs, from the southern and northern hemispheres, and you'll get a long-lasting, colorful display.

Most amaryllis bulbs grown in the U.S. are imported from Holland, and their natural bloom time is January through March, but exactly when the flowers will open is impossible to predict. The best strategy is to choose several different varieties and plant them three to four weeks apart during November, December, and January so you'll always have flowers coming into bloom.

Kick off the holiday season with amaryllis bulbs imported from growers in the southern hemisphere. As we enter autumn, it's springtime in South America, and these bulbs are eager to begin to bloom. Pot them up before early November for flowers in December.

If you are a fan of the popular color pink, there is an amaryllis for you. Pink Surprise Amaryllis has enormous hot pink flowers with a silky sheen and a touch of white at the tip. It is a standout and perfect as a centerpiece on the dining room table

or as a colorful welcome when displayed on a table by your front entrance.

For those who prefer something a bit more subtle, check out Terra Cotta Star. The soft watercolor hues of salmon, rose, buttercream and pistachio along with its dark veins add an artistic flare to each blossom.

Showcase and enjoy your colorful amaryllis by displaying it on a mantle, kitchen counter, or entryway table. Then watch the amazing show as the first sprout appears, followed by buds and finally, its spectacular trumpetshaped blooms. Or cut a few flowers to enjoy as long-lasting cut flowers. •

HOME IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS WITH THE BEST RETURN ON INVESTMENT

Essentially a facelift improving signs of discoloration, scratches, and even signs of water damage. The return on investment for this project was estimated at 147% which makes it an excellent choice for a home improvement project.

2. New Wood Flooring (118% ROI)

Buyers want durable and long-lasting materials in their homes and wood is a solid choice for durability and quality. New wood flooring scored high on NAR's report, at 118% return

on investment. If you're looking to add value to your property, consider installing new wood floors.

3. Insulation Upgrade (100% ROI)

More homeowners are looking for ways to increase their home's energy efficiency, and one option is an insulation upgrade, especially for older homes that don't have enough insulation. Whether attic insulation, wall insulation, or basement and crawlspace insulation - this upgrade saw a 100% return on investment. Not only will this make your home more energy efficient, but it will also save you money in the long run.

4. Basement Conversion to Living Room (86% ROI)

Adding usable living space and improving the livability of one's property is an excellent way to not only attract more potential buyers, but a great way to increase the value

of your home. A basement conversion may seem like a large project, but in terms of return on initial investment, NAR estimated an 86% ROI, making it a top option for those looking to remodel or increase property value.

5. Closet Renovation (83% ROI)

Storage is an important and often sought-after feature for homebuyers, and having ample usable storage will make a property stand out. Renovating a closet by adding features (shelving, drawers, etc.) or improving overall usability ranked high on the remodeling impact report, coming in at an 83% return on investment.

TOP 5 EXTERIOR REMODELING PROJECTS FOR 2024

1. New Roofing (100%)

A property's roof is one of the most important parts of its structure, and buyers look highly on properties that have had improvements done to make the home more sound. Adding new roofing is the process of applying a new layer of roofing material over the existing layer (also known as an overlay). Re-roofing is dependent on the condition of the existing roof, but any improvements to a property's roof will see a high return on

investment (100%), and re-roofing is often a more economical option than a completely new roof.

2. Garage Door (100% ROI)

For many homes, the garage door is one of the first things you see on a property. An old, worn-out garage door can be an eyesore, especially for potential buyers. A new garage door is a quick project that can be done for a relatively small investment (when compared to other projects). A new door will look nice, attract buyers, and will have a great return on investment: 100%.

3. Fiber Cement Siding (86% ROI)

Another important and integral part of a property is siding, or the protective material attached to the exterior of the structure that defends against weather, impacts, and other intrusions like insects. Upgrading to fiber cement siding (a durable, longlasting, and low-maintenance material made of cement, sand, water, and cellulose fibers) can see a high return on investment - 86% according to NAR's 2022 Remodeling Impact Report.

4. Vinyl Siding (82% ROI)

If fiber cement siding is not an option, the next best option is vinyl siding - a durable, plastic exterior wrapping that can imitate wood and is used for both decoration and weatherproofing. For homeowners that chose to add new siding (both vinyl and fiber cement), 93% had a greater desire to be at home after completing the project. Whether you're choosing new siding for adding value or another personal reason, many homeowners see a good return on investment for this project (82% for vinyl siding).

5. Vinyl Windows (67% ROI)

Windows can take a beating, and they tend to show their wear, especially older windows. Vinyl windows, or windows made of polyvinyl chloride (PVC), are windows made from a synthetic plastic material, making them resistant to rot and decay, meaning they will retain their efficacy throughout the years. Vinyl windows are also energy efficient, making them a top choice for homeowners looking to increase the efficiency of their homes. If your home has a lot of windows, the cost to replace them can be high - but for those looking to make the switch, you can see a potential 67% return on investment.

Remodeling and home improvement projects don't need to be a complete overhaul of your property - you can choose what best fits your budget, time frame, and how you're looking to improve your home. Just be aware that some projects will have a higher return on investment than others. If you're looking to sell soon or in the future, a project with a high ROI that will boost your property's value is an excellent option. •




HOW TO DEEP CLEAN YOUR HOME

DUST

Vacuum carpets, rugs, and upholstery. Sweep and mop hard floors. Pay special attention to corners, under and behind furniture. When was the last time you moved your sofa or pulled your bed away from the wall for a good vacuum? If you have the time and budget, consider steam cleaning carpets and rugs for a thorough spring refresh.

KITCHEN



HOW TO GET A THIS WINTER

'ust like us, insects spend their winters in different locations. Unlike us, they spend their winters in different stages of development. Some may overwinter as adults, others in their immature stage as grubs, caterpillars, or nymphs, while others will be in the pupal stage chrysalis a or cocoon. Understanding their lifecycle and location can help us support beneficial insects while managing problem insect pests.

Invite beneficial insects like lady beetles, parasitic wasps, and predatory mites to your landscape to help manage populations of plantdamaging pests. Add a birdbath to encourage insect-eating songbirds into your gardens. Most songbirds eat insects or feed them to their young while adding color, movement, and entertainment to your garden.

Keeping your plants healthy with proper care is the first and an important step in anv management strategy. Healthy plants are better able to tolerate pest attacks and are more likely to recover from the damage.

Despite your best efforts, insect pests may attack and damage your plants. Birds and predaceous insects often manage small populations but there may be times you decide to intercede. Winter is a great time to monitor and, in many cases, manage plantdamaging insects.

Scale insects can be one of these and come in a variety of colors and shapes, but all grow and reproduce under a waxy covering. This covering protects them from predators, desiccation, and pesticides. Depending on the scale species they may overwinter as an

immature scale, fertilized female, or eggs under the protective covering.

Treating plant damaging scale in early spring is one way to jump-start control of this pest while having minimal or no impact on beneficial insects that will help manage this pest. Take some time now to check plants for problem pests like the invasive oyster shell scale. This insect is not native to North America and is a pest of more than 130 species of plants including poplars, ash, beech, maple, willows, dogwood, cotoneaster, and lilacs. Adult scale insects form a grayish to dark brown protective covering called a test that resembles an oyster or mussel shell. In the fall the mated female lays 20 to 100 eggs inside the test, dies and the eggs remain there throughout the winter.

Removing heavily infected twigs and

branches is an option when the scale population is contained in a small portion of the plant. You can also gently scrape the scale off branches and stems with a plastic dish scrubber. Be careful not to damage thin-barked plants.

Another option is to apply organic lightweight horticulture when plants are dormant. The temperatures must be 40 degrees or higher when treating. As always, read and follow label directions for effective and safe control. Since the eggs are so well protected, a second application of the horticulture oil can increase success. Make a second application, if needed, when the eggs hatch and the immature insects known as crawlers emerge in spring after the buds have burst.

As you survey your landscape this

winter, pay special attention to stressed plants and those susceptible to oyster shell scale and other insect pests common in your area. Plants exposed to road dust and pesticides may also be more vulnerable as these conditions negatively impact predators and parasites that help manage plant pests.

Regularly monitoring plant health, working with nature, and strategically managing invasive pests like the oyster shell scale can help improve the health, vigor, and longevity of your landscape plants. •




